BAPTIST CHURCH HIGHLIGHTS

Sunday morning the pastor's text was taken from Philippians 1:21. The words of Paul when he said: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain." No man has surpassed Paul in his ideal of Christianity. At the time he wrote these words Paul was in prison. The Emperor's decision may result in his execution. If he was set free he would go to Philippi.

Christ was the author of his life. Paul had experienced conversion some thirty years before this. The old thing had passed away, to him all things had become new. Paul had been persecuting the Christians, when the light of God shone around him. He asked the question "Who art Thou Lord?" the answer "I am Jesus whom thou persecutest." Paul immediately said, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" From here the new life began. Looking back to his beginning Paul wrote: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain."

Christ was a product of his life. This is what determines the extent we are Christians. If the life of Christ is implanted in us we will reproduce Christ. To Paul this was to influence men to accept Christ. He would look at Nero and say: "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain."

For many people to live is no more pleasure or fame. If we can do nothing to live in Christ, we are no longer Christians. We must start where Paul started. Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?
