Dear Mr. Editor:
In about two weeks a National Campaign will be getting under way to raise funds for an organization known as the UNITED EMERGENCY FUND FOR BRITAIN.

We have been approached by this organization to conduct a campaign locally, but after considering the matter, it has been decided that since there are already two well known organizations here doing work of this nature, it would be best to avoid further duplication of effort and leave the field clear for these two locally represented groups to carry out their programs, calling on all interested citizens to help out as best they can.

The Georgetown Lions Club and its associated clubs will be carrying on their "Parcels for Britain" plan in which all expenses involved are underwritten by the Lions Club (this year the Credit Valley Club is taking responsibility for these costs). All contributions are thus spent on the parcels themselves, contents of which are purchased at bulk rates, making a further saving over individually prepared parcels.

This season the Lions' Objective is one hundred thousand dollars and this is to be raised through donations and tag days. The Lions will greatly appreciate any cash donations toward their fund. Contributions should be made to Mr. D. M. Timbers, chairman of the Fund for Georgetown.

The other local group providing parcels for Britain, is the IODE. Their system is as follows: The WVS in England gives the Chapter the names of two needy families in Britain, and the Chapter pledges itself to send a parcel to each of these families every month. Funds and goods for these parcels are contributed by the members mainly, but any assistance from interested persons in the way of cash donations or suitable goods will be gratefully received by the Convener of the Parcels Fund, Mrs. John T. Armstrong.

As is the case with the Lions Club, the IODE takes care of administration and handling costs in connection with their program. For anyone interested in contributing to the United Emergency Fund for Britain, remittances should be sent to the Treasurer, U.E.F.B., Room 404, 11 King St. W., Toronto.
