Christie, former president of the Ontario Agricultural College, was the guest speaker and this veteran leader of Ontario Agriculture, who was introduced by W. E. Brecken of Freeman, was in his old form and delighted his audience with his dynamic message. The programme also included delightful numbers by the Campbellville-Lowville Double Quartette.

"The Halton Association has the most efficient Board of directors and runs the best organized and best managed Match which I have ever visited," stated Winfred Timbers, a veteran plowman of York County, who with N. G. McLeod of Galt, R. No. 7, were the two official judges of the day. The latter corroborated this statement and congratulated the Halton Board on its efficient and smooth running

programme throughout the day. C. F. Pickett, President of the Halton Association, was the able chairman for the programme which also included brief addresses by Warden George Cleave, Stanley L.
