tenders should be called.
Davidson — We felt we were getting a good deal. There's no law that says we have to call for contracts.

Herbert — I think from now on we should allow local contractors a chance to tender.

Whitnee — The question came up two weeks ago and I mentioned then that local contractors should be given consideration.

Gibbons — We are talking about something that is already done. To a considerable extent this was a continuation of the contract. I would be in favour of giving every consideration to local men in any future project.

Norman Fendley said that over a year ago he had been more or less promised water service to his house on the highway and, asked when that might be expected, Council gave him no definite answer, except that Deputy Reeve Armstrong said that the water by-law which would be discussed later in the evening would have some bearing on his request.

Were informed by the Hydro that a tree survey in town showed 536 trees which required immediate clearance and the estimated cost would be \$2346 for which the hydro would be willing to pay half. The matter was filed for the attention of next year's council.

Instructed the clerk to write to a resident and tell him that his water service would be cut off if water pipes into his house were not properly buried underground. It was reported that the man in question had for some years run a tap all winter in order to keep pipes from freezing and this could not be allowed in view of the serious water shortage.

Decided that if it was legal, all council members would serve on the Court of Revision next Monday rather than the five appointed.

(Moved by Davidson and Armstrong.)

Will install a telephone in the Town Foreman's office in the Municipal Building.
(Moved by Goodlet and Herbert)

Will investigate whether a street light is needed on Charles Street between Factory and William Streets.

Were told by Assessor Arnott Early that 209 dog tags had been sold in 1948 with revenue of \$344. Last year's revenue was \$293. He also reported a population of 3150 according to the present assessment and a taxable assessment of \$1,499,231.

Will have a survey made with regard to obtaining an easement for a water line to be placed over private property near Normandy Boulevard to drain water onto town property.
(Moved by Armstrong and Goodlet)

Gave second reading for a by-law to borrow \$80,000 for making improvements to the water system as recommended by Philips, Dine and Roberts.

(1st reading moved by Herbert and Goodlet. 2nd reading by Whitnee and Davidson. Mayor Gibbons asked for a recorded vote and was the sole voter against the resolution.)

Will establish a new water schedule as recommended in the above report, to be effective the first of next year.

(1st reading moved by McCumber and Hill. 2nd and 3rd readings by Davidson and McLaren. Mayor Gibbons again asked a recorded vote and voted against it.)

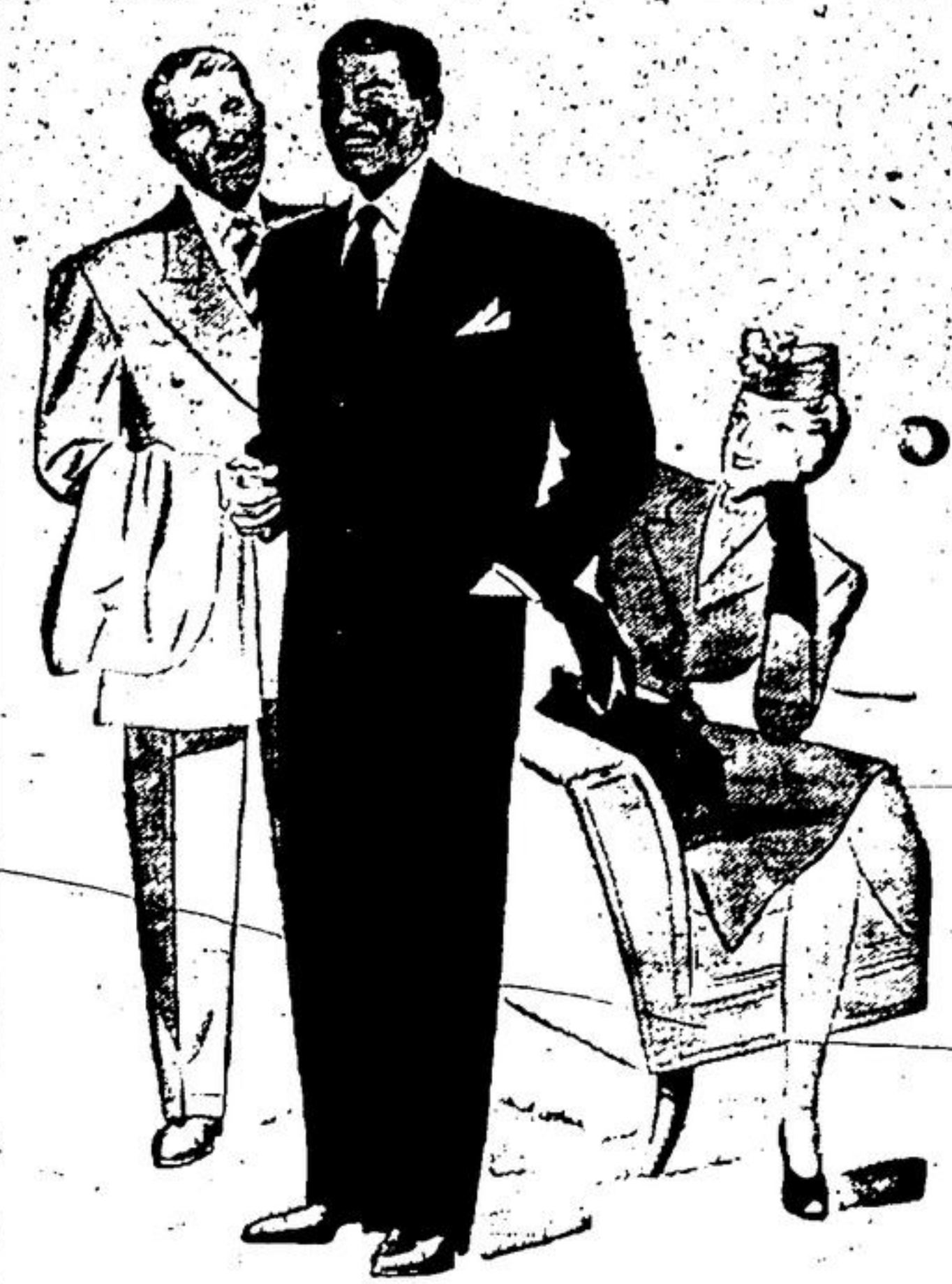
