Is your mind ever blank just when you want to be extra keen? Isn't it handy to have a cold to blame your thickheadedness on?

Here are a few facts on heating costs. The standard measure for heat is the British Thermal Unit which is the amount of heat required to raise 1 lb. of water 1 degree F. at sea level pressure. With the accepted rating of prepared domestic stoker coal at 14,000 B.T.U. per pound and domestic fuel oil at 178,315 B.T.U.'s per imperial gallon, one ton of stoker coal produces 28,000,000 B.T.U.'s. It will require 158.8 gallons of domestic fuel oil to produce the same number of heat units.

When the cost per imperial gallon of domestic fuel oil is 16 cents a gallon, 17 cents a gallon, 18 cents a gallon.

Then the equivalent value per ton of prepared domestic stoker coal is \$25.41 a ton, \$27.00 a ton, \$28.58 a ton.

Oil treated, prepared domestic stoker sells for \$17.00 a ton.

What Council Did

operation and more facilities.

Goodlet — The GRC took on a big job.

Whitnee — I don't mean to criticize the men serving on the GRC. A lot of credit is due them for the time they have given during the past three years.

Goodlet — I don't know that the town needs recreations for grown-ups. Sports for the young people is the main thing.

Whitnee — Nowadays youth has been set on a pedestal.

Goodlet — We should have sports but handicrafts and knitting clubs and things like that can be taken care of from other sources.

Davidson — I agree with Mr. Goodlet. I am quite sure a referendum would be voted down and I can see no reason for submitting it to a vote.

Goodlet — It would be a money by-law and limited to ratepayers.

Herbert — I am seconding the resolution because I think we should have recreation.

A resolution for increasing the grant from 1 mill to 2 mills was then presented by McCumber and Herbert. Speaking to the motion, Mayor Gibbons said he did not intend to support it but would suggest that it state a sum of money as council is not paying a mill grant, but is paying two-thirds of the director's salary.

Whitnee — We have an organization trying to do a job that hasn't been done in a satisfactory way and now they ask for more money. The whole thing is hasty. I would like to see the GRC form a concrete plan, then present it to council.

Gibbons — There are many reasons why I would vote against the motion. When we went ahead with a sewerage system we knew that for a time it would cripple all civic services and now we are discussing asking more money for recreation. There has been no great activity outside of running dances for teenagers.

McCumber — I told the GRC they might as well as disband as ask for another mill at this time, but they felt the only way they would know if people wanted organized recreation was by vote.

Armstrong — Would it be in order for us to increase the grant next year even without a vote?

Gibbons — I don't think we can give a grant. At present we are not making a one-mill grant. We are paying a portion of the director's salary.

Armstrong — Then this motion is out of order.

Goodlet — We could ask the voters whether they favour a recreation program.

Whitnee — A program should be presented before any question is asked.

Gibbons — Lack of heat is given as the reason why a full program cannot be carried out. I don't think the town is in a position to spend four or five thousand dollars for this at the present time.

An amendment to the motion was made by Whitnee and Goodlet that the question of extra money for the GRC be left till next year until the GRC submits a program acceptable to the citizens of the town.

Armstrong — I'm interested in knowing if the people are prepared to pay extra money for recreation.

Maclaren — The ratepayers are going to say no.

Gibbons — It would be folly to spend this money in view of other heavy expenditures.

Whitnee — In putting the amendment I don't want to see the GRC fold up. I would prefer for the amendment to go through, the GRC to formulate a program, then ask for support. The taxpayers would throw out a vote on an increased grant and that would be the end of the GRC.

Gibbons — The amendment is meaningless because if the original motion is out of order the matter would be left over anyway. If Mr. Newman's resignation took effect this year we could deal with the matter, but as he is not resigning until the end of the year it is a matter for next year's council.

The motion and amendment were both withdrawn by the movers.

Were told by town foreman Ern Hyde that in answer to a complaint by Clarence Walters one side of a drain on the 9th Line had been cleaned out and the rest of the work would be done as soon as possible.

Cr. Whitnee complained that the roads, excluding those which had been torn up by Scott, Jackson, had never been in such poor condition and pointed particularly to the road between the two paper mills. Cr. Goodlet, road chairman, said everything could not be done at once and at present the town men were busy with drainage work on Normandy Blvd. and could not be doing two jobs at once.
