## What Council Did . . .

ON MONDAY, NOVEMBER 22nd

Passed a by-law authorizing for the current instalment of sewerage debentures, a special Local Improvement tax levy of 1¢ per foot, the first instalment to be due before December 15th, this year; and providing a penalty of ½¢ of 1 per cent per month after January 1st, (1st and 2nd readings moved by Maclaren and Davidson; 3rd, read by Armstrong and Goodlet).

Asked Engineer C. R. Hagey to survey a plan whereby residents of Ostrander Boulevard would put in sewerage at their own expense providing they were exempted from the 1¢ per foot Local Improvement Levy.

The plan had been presented on behalf of these ratepayers at the last council meeting by Mayor Gibbons and council had reached no decision as they wished more information before committing themselves. Richard Hawes spoke for a delegation at Monday's meeting which included Norton Nelson, Dick Riddell and Jack Graham and first said that the town would receive \$1500 in Local Improvement taxes for the job and asked if the town would pay the extra \$700 for the sewerage put in privately at an estimated cost of \$2200. The idea was not favourable to council, Mayor Gibbons saying he had favoured the original proposal but not this one. Reeve Maclaren said that if one street were done on this basis it would create a precedent for others to ask the same. Road Chairman Gooldie said that while the present council could not speak for next year's that there was every possibility that the new council would favour the immediate extension of sewerage in this area. It could not be started until after the new year because after council passing a resolution in good faith to have it done, it was found that the original sewerage debentures would not allow the extra expenditure. The property owners concerned were left to decide whether they would proceed with the plan as originally outlined, a straw vote of council favouring this agreement, subject to the engineer's approval that the extension would be consistent with the master plan and would allow further extensions in the future where necessary.

Mayor Gibbons reported that a delegation composed of himself, Reeve Maclaren, and Councillors McCullum and Whitmee had met last Wednesday with the chairman of the Municipal Board and that the chairman had given them no reason to doubt that the debenture issue for waterworks extensions would be approved by the board. The mayor said the chairman had said that it would be the denunciative way to submit the question to a vote of ratepayers. Reeve Maclaren said he had also said that at these were some things in which a council was justified in going ahead without a vote. Cr. Davidson said that while he had originally favoured not voting he now had some doubts and that he thought it worth considering a referendum. Cr. McCullum said the by-law had had the support of every council member except the mayor and that the matter should be settled.

Asked the clerk to contact through the local members of parliament, the Honourable Dept. of Trade and Commerce and the Ontario Dept. of Planning and Development with a view to asking prospective industries who might be interested in locating in the Provincial Paper lower mill which is now shut down and being boarded up. The matter was brought up by Cr. Gooldie who said he considered it council duty to find out what Provincial Paper planned to do with the mill. Deputy Reeve Armstrong said he believed company officials felt they could give no definite answer for six months, but that he thought the town should contact the company first. Mayor Gibbons said that the Board of Trade had been having discussions with a firm from Windsor who were interested in this location. Cr. Gooldie thought it better to have a potential industry lined up before approaching the company.

Purchased a vacu-draft from D. R. McLaughlin for \$25 as an aid to heating system in the Municipal Building. (Moved by McCullum and Whitmee)

Cr. Whitmee mentioned that the town dump was almost filled up and that some action would have to be taken on this soon. The referee said consideration should be given to purchasing adjoining property.

### Presentation To Esquerring Veterans Last Night

Residents of Ward 3, Esquerring Township, paid tribute to their men and women who had served in Canada's armed forces last night, when they held an evening in their honour in the Community Hall at Stewarttown. Funds had been raised some time ago for the presentation, but because there was no suitable public hall in the ward, the event was postponed until the new hall opened.

Rey. Ross K. Cameron of Toronto, a former Georgetown man and himself an air force padre in the war, was present to make the presentation. Mr. K. C. Lindsay was chairman of the event. Following the presentation Doris Hull's Orchestra played for dancing and refreshments were served. The speakers' list included Rev. George Cleave and Deputy Reeve George Currie. Harry Hale accompanied at the piano by Miss Jessie Leavitt, entertained with comic songs.

Mantel clocks were presented to the next-of-kin of four townsmen who lost their lives while serving overseas. These were Flying Officer Norman Baily, Lieut. John Bowman, Pte. Harry Dickenson and Flying Officer William McLaughlin.

### Two Local Residents In Bus Accident

A head-on collision between a Guelph bound Gray Coach bus and an ice cream truck early Friday morning sent five persons to Guelph hospital. The accident occurred at the junction of the Eden Mills road and No. 7 Highway, seven miles north-east of Guelph. The bus, driven by J. Cody was struck by the truck which swerved into its path and the impact sent the bus over on its side. Mr. Cody was pinned in the driver's seat so tightly that it was necessary to cut off his shoes in order to get him out of the wrecked vehicle. Passengers scrambled through the broken windows. The big way was also fed or some time to the trucked vehicles.

Two Georgetown people were passengers on the bus. Gear Henderson, who was on his way to Guelph to see his wife and son, born the day after at Guelph General Hospital, sustained bruise to his leg and some flesh to injuries due to fire, the bus was still burning on the highway. He was treated in Guelph.

Ashgrove, Nov. 15, 1898

The regular weekly prayer meeting was held in the church, at the end of which a business meeting was held for the purpose of organizing an Epworth League. Rev. G. A. Mitchell occupied the chair. Mr. A. H. Bradbridge was elected president by ballot. Miss M. A. Nixon, A. H. vice-president. Pledges were taken up by several and Mrs. S. K. Ruddell was appointed to take up the Sunday School lesson at the next meeting.

Ashgrove, Nov. 29, 1898

The Epworth League met in the church, the president in the chair. The meeting opened with singing and prayer and Miss Ada Hood gave a short review of the Sunday school lesson. Miss Ada Wrigglesworth read the topic on temperance, Mr. Mitchell also making a few remarks. A business meeting was then held. Mr. Mitchell presiding. Howard Hood was elected secretary-treasurer and Ada Hood vice-president of the 100 library corporation by ballot. Miss Alexander was appointed organist and others were also appointed for literary meeting to be held December 13th.
