Comments on the Lesson
by Rev. John M. Smith

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 5th
"History in The New Testament"

A few weeks ago our lesson was under the topic "History in the Old Testament". This week we are to consider the theme "History in the New Testament". One might wonder if there is any difference between the greatest distinction from a historic point of view is the fact that in the Old Testament writings the religious and secular history of the Israelites are closely knit together while the history of the New Testament is more particularly that of the beginnings of the church, recorded with very little reference to its significance in the main historic stream.

Principally we find this record of New Testament history in the Book of the Acts of the Apostles. It is the story of the faith of a few folk who knew the Christ living, dead and risen — the story of some ordinary citizens whose lot it was to be transformed by the spirit of Christ and who, no longer weak-minded and weak-hearted, went forward proclaiming "Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God". Here we have the account of their tours, sermons, prayers, healings and experiences which have inspired Christians of all generations from their day to ours. Here we have the story of their witness which was their reply to the "Great Commission" given them by their Risen Lord. "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

The Biblical Basis:
In order to get a good understanding of "History in the New Testament" one could do little better than read the Book of Acts through from beginning to end in very much the same fashion as one would read a chapter of any other book. For the purpose of this lesson however, we look only

at a few verses of special importance.

In Chapter 1:8 we read of a promise of power which is to come to the bewildered followers of the Christ, and a prediction that so empowered they are to be His witnesses. In our next passage 2:1-4 we find the promise and prediction being fulfilled in the Pentecost experience and the many converts are added to the church as a consequence. From this day forward the Apostles made their influence upon the world in a spiritual, social, cultural and intellectual way.

In Chapter 13:1-3 Barnabas and Paul are set apart for special missionary activities and they leave the Church at Antioch to travel hither and yon with the message of the Risen Christ. Our next passage speaks of the challenge to carry the gospel to Macedonia and Paul's immediate response which opened up a new field of endeavor for the early church.

The last passage chosen for study shows Paul now a prisoner in Rome, but a prisoner favoured by the authorities and allowed to dwell in his "own hired house", to receive visitors, and to preach and teach the Christian faith.

The Application:
The history of the Christian Church did not end with Paul in Rome but continued on through the centuries, and is continuing today — the story of the church is still unfolding in the failures and achievements of churches at home and abroad. We as a part of the church are making history but unfortunately we seem to be rather careless about what kind of history we make. Modern indifference makes timid reading alongside the zeal of other days. We would do well to catch again the vision of the Risen Church embodied in the words: "Go teach all nations." We too need the power of the Holy Spirit to transform our self-centredness into that which is other-centred and Christ-centred in order that we might be His witnesses in our time. This reading again of the Acts of the Apostles surely ought to stir within us that desire to serve Christ and His cause. This we can only do if we consecrate
