Mrs. Roger Guyot Was Prominent Glen Resident

She is survived by her husband, one daughter, Mrs. G. M. Nixon (Vivienne) of Montreal, a son, Roger of Toronto, a brother, Andrew Jones of Barrie, a sister in South Africa and three brothers and three sisters in England.

Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson conducted the funeral service in St. Alban's Church on Wednesday. Pallbearers were Jim Burns, Jim Smith, Norman Jones, John Hepburn, Jack Crawford and Harry

Bibbs. Interment was made in Glen Williams Cemetery.
