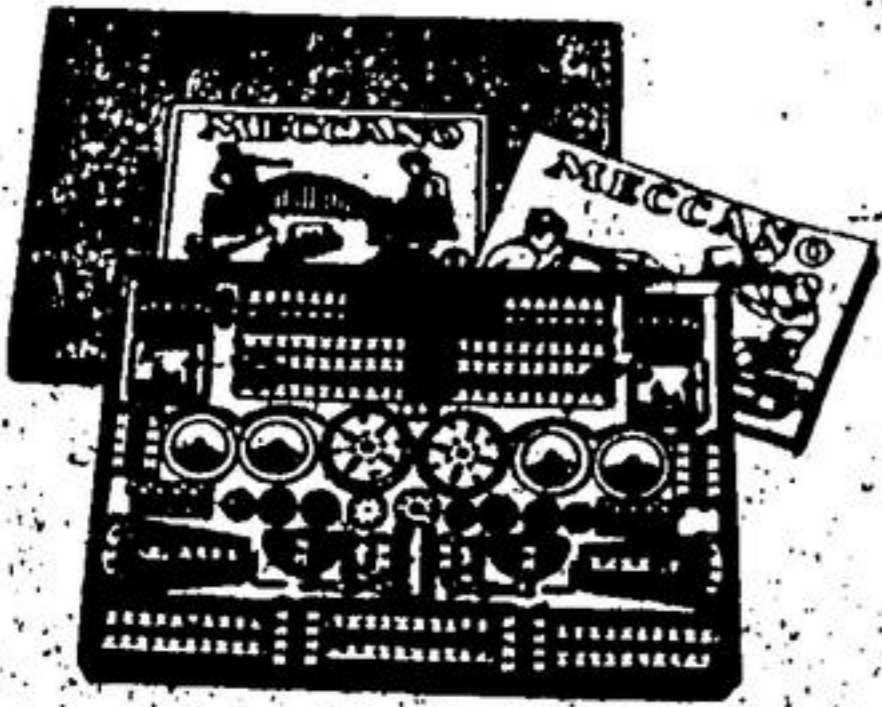

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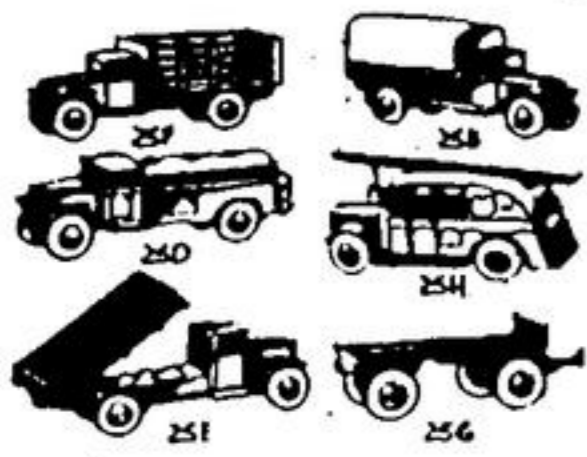
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HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

an additional source of primary water supply to supplement existing supplies;

(b) mains with a maximum diameter of six inches be provided in circuit to service the new built-up areas and that fire hydrants be placed not more than 500 ft. apart in the residential areas and not more than 250 feet apart in the business areas;

(c) that by-laws controlling construction and the storage of flammable liquids as well as the installations of oil-fired units be passed by the council to reduce the fire hazard;

(d) that a full-time paid fire inspector and chief of department be appointed immediately and provision be made to ultimately add at least one paid firefighter for every thousand population; in addition to the full complement of volunteers;

(e) the town council negotiate a firm financial arrangement with the councils of the near-by townships for fire protection and that an additional piece of apparatus suitable for responding to outside calls be provided.
