Tragedy has twice struck the home of Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kay recently. 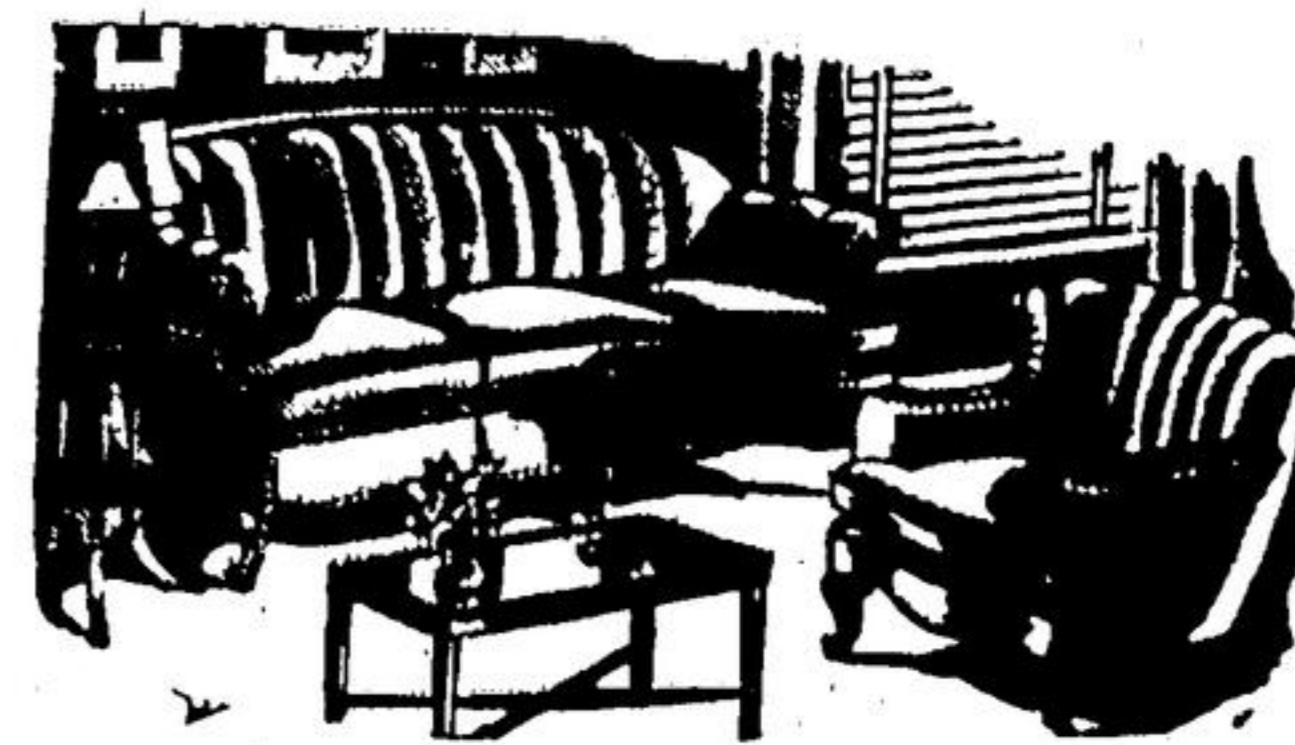
