for taxes would be well spent. As Aminimon and a spent retiring chairman of the School Area Board, he reviewed activities, In 1948 all teachers had been raised \$100, salaries at present ranging from \$1600 to \$1800. There had been no changes in staff. Major expenditures included the installation of hydro in Waterloo School, the last area school to be without this, rewiring Norval School, painting S.S. 14 and shingling the Glen School.

School Trustees Speak

Hector Bird spoke of the success of the school area to date and said two more schools would be joining it in January. A major problem facing the board was overcrowding at the Glen school where at present there was 80 pupils with only two teachers. R. L. Davidson, the new trustee, thanked the voters for electing him and said he would do his best to justify their confidence. R. N. Brown, who announced he would not be a council candidate, | said that if the school area was 'good for 50 per cent of the town-Elgin St., Georgetown, off King ship he could see no reason why council did not compel the other sections to join. He also thought the north end of the township did not receive as much attention as

the south end.

Following these speeches, the meeting was thrown open for discussion. Reeve Cleave spoke again, saying that he did not favour foreing anyone into the public school area and that he believed in time everyone would come in of their own accord. He was happy to have been warden of a county which was the first to take action on reforestation. He also explained that one reason taxes were a little higher in 1948 was because Esquesing had been paying a double high years; Simmons spring filled mat- school rate (the county rate plus a levy for the new High School Area). In 1949, there would be no county rate for this. In answer to a question, D. R. McLaughlin, member of the North Halton High School Board, said that the government pays 75 per cent of the mileage on school buses and per cent of the general school costs. Two ratepayers wondered if the council should not receive more remuneration than \$3 a meeting. The total cost of administering a. \$112,000 business was only \$785. Another ratepayer said that a few years ago he had criticized council for inadequate anow removal but this year they had done a grand job and he wanted to compliment
