There was considerable smoke damage and a hole was burned in the floor where the tree had stood. Wallpaper was scorched, woodwork blistered and several pans of glass cracked and the family Christmas presents, which had been under the tree, were destroyed.

Expect Milk Price Rise Next Week

A 1c or 2c increase in the price of milk is expected next week. Yesterday, the decision of an arbitration board was made known, which grants farmers an increase of 30c and 25c a hundredweight in a number of districts, including Georgetown. This price increase is effective on January 8th and it is expected that local retail prices will be adjusted at that time from 17c to 18c a quart.
