What Council Did

ON MONDAY, JANUARY 17th

Will instal sewers on Elgin, Ostrander, Sarah and Durham Streets as an extension to the present system.

(Moved by Goodlet and Armstrong)

Engineer C. R. Hagey was present to discuss this with council. The job will be handled mostly by the town men, except for excavating which will be done by W. L. Binnie. Cr. McCumber asked if council intended to get prices from any other contractors as last year Bob MacKenzie had been promised a chance at future work. Mayor Gibbons said Mr. Binnie had done good and cheap work and that any delay at present might hold up the job for several months. Goodlet and Davidson both said they were satisfied with Binnie's work and could see no reason to ask for other prices.

Appointed Stan Grabb to fill the unexpired term of Hydro Commissioner Art Booth, who resigned because he will be leaving town to make his home in Ottawa.

(Moved by Lyons and McNally)

This motion was an amendment to an original motion by Davidson and Hill that Hugh Lindsay, a former commissioner, be appointed. Cr. Davidson said it embarrassed him to make the motion as he had first promised his support to Mr. Grabb but had later been approached by Mr. Lindsay and he felt that it was a good idea to have industry represented on the hydro. The vote on the amendment was a tie, McNally, Lyons, Herbert and McCumber voting for it, and Davidson, Hill, Armstrong and Goodlet against. Mayor Gibbons then cast the deciding vote in favour of Mr. Grabb, saying he would be happy to have either of the men on the commission, but he had promised his support to Mr. Grabb.

Took no action on a request by a majority of the taxi companies to establish a set scale of charges. Clarence Kennedy and Stewart Simpson spoke on behalf of Arrow Taxi, Simpson's Taxi, Georgetown Taxi and the Glen Taxi. Mayor Gibbons said that he did not think it wise for council to interfere in private business to the extent of setting fees.

Kennedy — We aren't asking you to set rates, but to approve them. If tax rates become cut-throat all the taxis will suffer. In the majority of towns, council sets rates and maintains them. We feel rates here are fair.

McCumber — A man won't stay in business long if he is operating at a loss.

Armstrong — I can see the point, but I think rate setting is outside our jurisdiction.

Goodlet — Is this petition 100%?

Kennedy — Only one taxi has not signed.

Goodlet — Has he been approached?

Kennedy — I don't believe so.

Goodlet — I would like to approach this man and see if he would sign it. If he would, I would be agreeable to endorsing this.

Herbert — Are you afraid of local price cutting?

Kennedy — It has already happened. We want everybody on the same footing. Why should one slash prices?

Herbert — I think the rates very fair. It is too bad one man attempts to slash prices. It's the same as a man walking into a plant and cutting wages. These rates seem reasonable.

Gibbons — If this were passed it would be difficult to enforce.

Goodlet — If all the taxi operators favour it I would vote for it.

Gibbons — If they all favoured it, they wouldn't need a law. We have so much public business to do that if we start interfering with private business we're heading for trouble.

Davidson — The taxi by-law concerns safety of passengers. Rates should be decided by the operators themselves.

Lewis truck driver. Salaries are \$75, \$35 and \$50 respectively.

Authorized the assessor to sell dog tags, retaining 50 per cent as his commission.

(Moved by Herbert and Hill)

Set regular meeting nights as the first and third Mondays each month, the first only in July and August.

(Moved by McCumber and Herbert)

Received a mandatory order from the Ontario Dept. of Health ordering all the changes and improvements in water service as outlined in the engineer's report.

Gibbons — To put it bluntly, this stinks in my nostrils. This mandatory order is an affront to the council and the citizens. The Municipal Act says any unnecessary delay by council or individuals leaves us liable to a \$100 daily fine. This says that we shall pass the by-law and make our action meaningless. The order is not only complicated, it is unprecedented. If council were disregarding the matter I can see the point of ordering chlorination, but to order us to instal meters is pretty far-fetched. It puts us in the position of being rubber stamps for a \$80,000 expenditure and further debate is useless.

Goodlet — Isn't this order necessary before detentures can be issued?

Gibbons — If that is the case, detentures should never be issued.

Goodlet — It is a technicality to make the detentures saleable.

Gibbons — Why don't they fix the technicality?

Goodlet — They don't order us to spend \$80,000.

Gibbons — What they order would cost that.

McNally — Past experience would say more than \$80,000. As a new member I would like some discussion on this. I'm certainly not in favour of such a large expenditure.

Gibbons — Approval by the Municipal Board of the borrowing by-law will no doubt soon be through. Would you like to leave the debate until that time.

Lyons — It looks as if we have a dictatorship.

McCumber — Council asked for the mandatory order.

Gibbons — Who did?

McCumber — We did. We asked Mr. Roberts (the engineer) to get it.

Gibbons — I opposed it.

Goodlet — It was never discussed here.

McCumber — Mr. Roberts said the order was necessary to sell detentures, and we gave him permission to ask for it.

McNally — If we could get a sufficient water supply from springs we wouldn't need chlorination.

Armstrong — I don't think either department wants us to spend \$80,000 unless it is necessary.

McNally — What interest can the Dept. of Health have in metering?

Armstrong — I think the matter should be left until Mr. Roberts is here.

Gibbons — May I suggest a full dress debate when the by-law is presented for third reading.

A special meeting is to be arranged later this month when the whole water question will come up for discussion.

A letter from the Scott, Jackson Co. said raw sewerage had been entering near the John Street pump station and there would be considerable expense to clear this out. The company would hold the town liable for this condition. Town foreman Hyde said he had the town solicitor's word that Scott, Jackson had connected certain services to the system themselves and had told others to go ahead and do so. The clerk was instructed to write the company concerning this.

Mr. Hagey reported that he had been practically assured that the sewerage system would be in operation sometime next week. The disposal pump had arrived and the only thing left to do was the pouring of 13" of cement to form a platform under it and this was to be done the next day.

A letter from the county M.O.H. recommended renewing all local restaurant licences.

The foreman's report asked that consideration be given this year to providing a warehouse for town equipment. Goodlet and Herbert both expressed themselves as very much in favour of this.

Appointed K. M. Langdon to act for the town in a hearing about the John Street subway widening before the Board of Railway Commissioners, which will be held in Georgetown as soon as it can be arranged.

(Moved by Davidson and McNally)

Asked the Dept. of Highways to attend to fixing the highway near the White Bridge and in front of St. George's Church, also to sand the highway hilly as soon as possible during the ice storms.

Were asked by Cr. Hill to try to get action on the widening of St. Michael Street by the CNR.

Cr. Davidson said he thought this year council should get away from doing business over the telephone and that when people called the mayor they should be referred to the proper committee chairman.

Cr. McCumber said he noticed in the committee lists that recreation had been crossed out, and asked if that meant that council was not supporting recreation. The mayor said that recreation was disorganized at the present time and he thought it better to leave it out and that it could be better handled by the GRC.

DAUGHTERS ATTEND CHURCH VESTRY MEETING

The biggest show ever staged in Georgetown is booked into the Arena on Friday January 21 when the Georgetown Girl's Pipe Band sponsors the Skating Follies. Reserved tickets, which are on sale at three downtown locations as well as from members of the band, are finding a ready response and a sell-out is anticipated for this ambitious undertaking. In addition to the 1,000 reserved seats which will be sold at \$1.00, 500 rush seats are offered at 75c.

The ice show will be presented by members of the University Skating Club of Toronto, which has been rated as the second best such club in Canada. The troupe of forty included such specialty performers as Toby Keeler, Master Jim Wilson, Master Charles Snelling, Norman Falkner, Marian Wilson, James Fraser and Yvon Douflet.

Items on the program which catch the eye include "Fiesta Time", "Information, Please," the Dutch Waltz, European Waltz, the Ten-Fox and a comedy act by Fraser and Doucet. Assisting artists are Miss Barbara Jacques, Miss Elizabeth Leleu and Mr. Derwyn Potts, from the Hamilton Skating Club, the latter two a champion adagio pair. The Lorne Scots have also been hired for the occasion to provide overture music.

A feature of the decoration scheme will be the use for the first time in Georgetown of painted ice. For the show, the ice surface will be painted a brilliant green, with harmonizing colours used in the other decorations. A dressing room is being constructed at the far end of the arena and entrances of the performers will be spotlighted. The show is on a par with anything to be seen in the city and interest is running high as the evening approaches when a new high in entertainment will be reached.

Regular Sunday morning worship was conducted in Georgetown United Church on Sunday by the minister, Rev. John M. Smith. The lesson was read from Isaiah, chapter 1, verses 10-20.
