### BIERN IS BOARD OF EDUCATION CHAIRMAN

Walter Biern, who headed the polls in the December vote for Georgetown's first Board of Education, was chosen chairman of the new board when the first meeting was held in the High School on Wednesday evening. Members of the board are Dr. J. B. Milne, Edwin Wilson, Riley Brethour, John Bell, S. W. Orr and Mrs. Harry Watkins. Walter T. Evans, secretary of the former High School Board, administered the oath of office and turned over the books and accounts of that board to the new group. P. B. Harrison, secretary-treasurer of the old Public School Board performing a similar act. Mr. Harrison was chosen as acting secretary for the meeting.

The board decided to advertise for applicants for the position of secretary-treasurer, with written applications to be in the hands of the chairman by January 25th. A special meeting will be held in the Public School the next evening to deal with the applications.

Some discussion took place about the question. A motion was made by Orr and Milne that a secretary-treasurer be appointed at the meeting and failing this that the situation be advertised. An amendment by Brethour and Wilson asked that this be re-worded as a secretary and treasurer. The chairman, who expressed himself as favouring advertising for the position, inasmuch as the board is an elected group administering taxpayers' money, asked for a recorded vote. The amendment was lost, Brethour, Wilson and Bell voting for it and Orr, Milne and Biern against. (Mrs. Watkins was not present at the meeting). The original motion then carried, Brethour and Biern being the dissenting voters.

Mr. Harrison was offered the position of secretary treasurer but declined to make a decision as he was not sure whether he was in a position to handle both jobs. It was then decided to advertise.

The board decided by resolution to fix the maximum salary for the joint position at \$600. Previously the Public School Board had paid Mr. Harrison \$300 as secretary-treasurer and the High School Board had paid \$150 to Mr. Harrison as treasurer and \$200 to Mr. Evans as secretary.

As no one is authorized to sign cheques until the appointment of a treasurer, several accounts presented were held over until a future meeting. The chairman and Mr. Bell were delegated to draft a committee set-up for presentation at the next meeting. Regular meeting times were set at 8 p.m. on the second Wednesday of each month, with meetings to be held alternately at Public and High Schools.

Mr. Wilson said he believed the board should at an early date familiarize itself with the High School District situation and the board decided to ask Mr. John Bingham, chairman of last year's High School Board for a brief outlining the situation to date. This will be studied at a special meeting as soon as the facts are available.

A tour of the buildings and meeting of the teachers was suggested and this will be done in the near future.

### Annual Vestry Meeting at St. George's Church

The annual Vestry meeting of St. George's Church of England was held in the church basement on Monday evening, January 17th, according to canon.

The Rector, Archdeacon Thompson, opened the meeting with the Apostles' Creed and prayers. The minutes of last Vestry meeting were read by Mr. Wallace Thompson, Vestry Clerk, and adopted.

Reports were then presented to the Vestry by the Church wardens, Sunday School, Woman's Auxiliary, Daughters of the Church, the Auditors, the Little Helpers and the Choir.

All showed the affairs of the church to be in good condition. The Churchwardens' report showed all obligations met, debts paid off and a balance on hand. The decoration of the church was mentioned with cordial appreciation.

The Rector expressed appreciation of the faithful work of officials and organizations, and his remarks were followed by a resolution of thanks from the Vestry.

Rector's statistics from the registrar showed: baptisms 33, confirmations 12, marriages 19, Churchings 2, burials 19.

It was suggested that the printed financial report should contain brief reports from all Church organizations.

The elections resulted as follows: Rector's Warden—Thomas Eason; People's Warden—Frank Benner; Convener of Sidesmen—Harry Savings; Auditors—Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Thompson; Substitute for lay delegate—Harry Lewis; Warden's Committee—Mrs. D. W. Baxter, R. W. Prust, W. F. Bradley, Harry Savings, Fred McNally.

At the request of the wardens, the appointment of an envelope secretary was authorized and the appointment left to the Rector and Wardens.

A motion was passed requesting that the proposed extension for kitchen, choir vestries and lavatories be investigated as to cost, and action taken as soon as possible.

The assumption by the vestry of cost of Rectory phone, light and fuel was continued.

The matter of organizing a Junior Auxiliary and a Girls' Auxiliary was brought up and encouraged by the Vestry as a need in the Church.

It was thought that some form of covering for the basement floor should be provided.

The Vestry adjourned, and refreshments were served by the Woman's Auxiliary.
