## At County Council

ON TUESDAY, JANUARY 18th

Mrs. Mary Pettit, reeve of Nelson Township, was unanimously elected Warden of the county for 1949, and was installed in office with W. I. Dick, K.C., Crown Attorney, administering the oath of office. Two other councillors, Reeve Jack Armstrong of Georgetown and Reeve William Vansickle of Nassagaweya, withdrew as nominees in favour of Mrs. Pettit.

A petition signed by 125 Trafalgar Township ratepayers requested that Wards 1 and 2 transfer from the Oakville-Trafalgar High School district and enter the North Halton district. A resolution by Trafalgar council disapproved this because of financial considerations. The matter was turned over to Jack Armstrong's Education Committee for consideration and the committee will report at the next council meeting.

Standing committees for the year were chosen. Reeve Jack Armstrong of Georgetown is chairman of Education and serves on the committees of Finance, Agriculture and Reforestation. Deputy-Reeve James Goodlet of Georgetown heads an important new committee on Assessment and is a member of the Committees on Hospital Accounts and Special Communications. The Esquusing reeve, George Currie is Hospital Accounts and Special and Special Communications. Esquusing reeve George Currie is Hospital Accounts chairman. His committees are Roads, County Buildings, Agriculture and Reforestation. Deputy-Reeve George Leslie of Esquusing is a committee member of Education, Printing and Special Communications.

Warden Pettit and Miss Margaret Macted, county treasurer, were appointed to the county audit board for 1949.

Membership in the Good Roads Association was continued and the County Engineer and members of the Roads committee will be delegates at the annual convention in February.
