FARM FORUM IN HALTON

 Seventeen Forums reported on the social security broadcast, "In Time of Need". The Ontario office found that well over 90 percent of forums across the province were in favour of better social security measures, and Halton forums were mainly in accord with this opinion. Concerning the measures now effective the opinions were also pretty much the same. Darbyville spoke the general thought when it said, "Family allowance is beneficial if used in the right way." Some forums, like North Trafalgar, pointed out family allowances may "make people lazy, and spendthrifts will not save anything for future years." Appleton forum was one of the few which stated "The majority of the group were decidedly against baby bonuses." Concerning health measures, Town Line observed that "Hospitalization would be more helpful if there was not such a shortage of hospital space." Some forums were in favour of an over-all insurance plan for health security, which would be administered by the Dominion Government. Others thought co-operative action, such as is already existing in Co-operative Medical Services would be the better plan. Omagh contended "Social security should not be made a political issue." Several forums feared better social security would mean much higher taxes. On old age pensions, there was almost unanimous agreement that the pension should start at 65 years of age, be available to all, and that the means test be done away with. Limestone said, "The amount paid should be on a sliding scale based on the cost of living index, with a minimum of \$40 a month." Most forums were of the opinion that a great portion of our population are not able to prepare for old age under the economic conditions that exist. It was also pointed out that many people cannot secure employment after they are sixty.
