Notice of the Closing of a Road in the Township of Esquesing

Notice of proposed By-law to close part of the original Allowance for Road between Lots 27 and 28, in the 9th Concession of the Township of Esquesing, more particularly described as follows:

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land situate, lying and being in the Township of Esquesing, in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario, and being composed of the original Allowance for Road between Lots 27 and 28 in the Ninth Concession of the said Township;

SAVING AND ACCEPTING thereof and therefrom that part of the said Allowance for Road which has been opened and improved and is being used as a Highway, and which said part is described as follows:

COMMENCING at a point being the intersection of the northwest limit of the said Allowance for Road with the northeast limit of a tresspass or Given Road established across the east halves of the said Lots 27 and 28 in lieu of the original Allowance for Road adjacent to the northeast limit of the said lots, the said point of commencement being distance 1360 feet, more or less, measured southwesterly along the northwest limit of the said Allowance for Road between Lots 27 and 28 from the most easterly angle of the said lot 28;

THENCE Southwesterly along the northwest limit of the said Allowance for Road between Lots 27 and 28, a distance of 620 feet, more or less, to the south limit of a tresspass or Given Road established in lieu of part of the Allowance for Road herein granted;

THENCE Southeasterly at right angles to the last said course a distance of 60 feet, more or less, to the southeast limit of said Allowance for Road between Lots 27 and 28;

THENCE Northeasterly along the said limit a distance of 613 feet, more or less, to the northeast limit of the first said tresspass road;

THENCE Northwesterly along the last said limit a distance of 66.37 feet, more or less, to the point of commencement, the whole of the original Allowance for Road between the said Lots 27 and 28 having an area of 6.667 acres, more or less, the part herein described for exemption having an area of 0.902 acres more or less, and the part herein granted having an area of 5.765 acres, more or less.

TAKE NOTICE that the Municipal Council of the Township of Esquesing will take into consideration the passing and if approved will pass at its meeting, to be held on Monday, March 7th, 1949, at the hour of one-thirty o'clock, in the afternoon, at the Municipal Chambers of the said Township, in the Village of Stewarttown, a By-law stopping up and selling the above-described property in the said Township; and the Council will at that time and place hear any person, or by his Counsel, Solicitor or Agent, who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the said By-law and who applies to be heard.

NEWS AND ITEMS OF INTEREST TO HALTON FARMERS

ANNUAL HALTON SEED FAIR AND BACON SHOW

The annual Halton Seed Fair and Bacon Show is scheduled for Milton, on March 25 and 26. At a recent meeting of the joint directorate of the Halton Crop Improvement Association and the Halton Hog Producers, the respective prize lists were drafted and initial plans made for this popular joint annual event.

As in former years the Seed Fair will be strictly a commercial event, or in other words, only those with seed for sale are eligible to make an exhibit and furthermore, the grain exhibited must be representative of that being offered for sale and all exhibits of grain and small seeds must be accompanied by a government grade.

Halton Junior Farmers are also planning to continue their Junior Farmer Section with individual classes in Oats, Barley and Wheat, and also inter-club displays.

We understand from president Bruce Reid of the Halton Hog Producers, that the Bacon Show will again be conducted on an inter-township basis as in 1948. Five hogs will be selected by the Township directors from each of the four townships and these will be processed and made into Wiltshire Sides and brought to Milton for display purposes. It is our understanding that these hogs are to be marketed on March 7, 8 and 9, which will provide ample time for the necessary processing and curing.

Those who anticipate having hogs ready to market around this period should contact one of the four Township chairmen, namely—

Esquesing, Bruce Reid; Nelson, Roy Ellenton; Trafalgar, Percy Merry; Nassagaweya, W. L. Ferguson.

This year's Seed Fair and Bacon Show is being held two weeks later than in former years, which should

provide ample time for those having seed for sale to get same cleaned up and to secure the necessary Government grade.

HALTON CONSERVATION COMMITTEE ACTIVE

The newly organized Halton Conservation Committee which is made up of representatives from the Agriculture and Reforestation Committee of the Halton County Council, as well as representatives from the Halton Federation of Agriculture, Halton Junior Farmers, Halton Crop Improvement Association, Halton Plowmen, Halton Sportsmen's Association, Halton Lumberman's Association and the Halton Trustees and Ratepayers' Association, recently met to lay plans for an active program in 1949.

We understand that there is a possibility of the Department of Lands and Forests stocking a few sites in Halton with Beaver, with a view to encouraging the erection of dams for the conservation of water.

Halton Junior Farmers have already made plans to carry on Reforestation projects during the present year.

It was also intimated that the County Forest project inaugurated and sponsored by the County Council, will be continued and also an inter-school reforestation project.

The committee is hopeful that one or two experimental dams may be erected during the current year and a committee has been appointed to select possible sites. The committee is also giving study to proper land use, and the building up of the organic matter and humus content of Halton soils.

It was the opinion of the committee that these matters are equally as important as the conservation of tree growth, etc., from the standpoint of the conservation of water and also from the standpoint of increased yields.

Stewarttown Native Commercial Traveller For 22 Years

A commercial traveller for twenty-two years, William John Kickley of 12 Ada Avenue, Brantford, died suddenly after a heart attack which he suffered in Niagara Falls on Wednesday, February 2nd. He was in his 66th year.

Mr. Kickley was born in Stewarttown, where he spent his early years, then moved to Brantford. For some years he was a well-known painter and decorator and for the past 22 years had been a representative in the Niagara peninsula and Western Ontario for the roofing division of the Canadian Gypsum Company Limited (Toronto Asphalt Roofing Company).

He was very well-known fraternally, being a member of Doric Lodge, AF & AM, Mount Horeb Chapter, RAM, Odo de St. Anand Preceptory, K.T., Mocha Temple Shrine, London, and the Brantford Shriners Club. He was widely known and a popular resident of Brantford.

He is survived by his widow the former Nellie Scott of Brantford and the following nieces and nephews, Robert, William and Kathleen Kickley, all of Toronto; Mrs. E. L. Arnold and Mrs. Elmer Dron of Georgetown; Howard Vint of Hamilton; and Mrs. Elmer Ingram and Clifford Mothersill of Brampton.

The funeral was held from the Reid and Brown Funeral Chapel in Brantford on Saturday, with interment in Greenwood Cemetery.

Designed primarily to evaluate the merits and qualities of the thousands of dollars worth of materials and supplies purchased daily by the railway, to discover new and better products, and to check and revise specifications for the multifarious requirements of the system and its ancillary companies, it has taken two years to bring the three sections of the new laboratories into full operation. Samples from every part of the country are tested in the C.N.R. plant at Montreal, and research is underway to develop and expand Canadian sources of supply.
