BAPTIST CHURCH HIGHLIGHTS
On Sunday morning the pastor used as his text 2 Cor. 3:18. The word church comes from the Greek word ecclesia meaning an assembly of people called out from the world and collected into Christ. The emphatic word is the pronoun "My", which distinguishes Christ's Church from the Greek and Hebrew assemblies. My church signifies that the church is not a human, but a Divine institution. The gates of hell shall not prevail against it. Satan in no way shall destroy it, for the life in the church is Christ.
Jesus focused His efforts on building a church, not on changing the government. If the hearts of men were right, the government and all else would be right. The work of the church is to build character. The sorest condition in the world today is the lack of character.
The church faces the infinite perfection of God, saying, "Thy Kingdom Come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven."
The early disciples carried on the building of the church because the Holy Spirit came down upon them. Their faith is what brought them their power. Faith will give the church power today.
