These men are all taxpayers and receive absolutely no remuneration for their services.

Your parks board certainly intend to abide by the law, even though they still feel they were doing the best thing for the youth - of the land. It is hoped that these unpleasant matters are now at an end, as your parks board feel that they have been unjustly criticized by a small minority, and especially about such remarks as we all read in your paper with reference to pagan institutions.

This kind of talk is uncalled for. It only tends to inflame matters and calls for a smart rebuke from your board, and the good citizens of Georgetown.
