Comments on the Lesson

STANDARDS OF THE KINGDOM

We continue our study of the life of Christ by looking at his great sayings as they appear in the 5th, 6th and 7th chapters of the Gospel of St. Matthew—the portion of scripture which we usually call the Sermon on the Mount. Here we have a picture of Jesus seated on a hillside speaking to a group of disciples and proclaiming to them something of the standards of His Kingdom. His audience was becoming acquainted with what it meant to be a follower of this man—here they were being schooled in the life of a Christian; the qualities that make up his character; the way he ought to behave; the manner in which his behaviour would be challenged and the possibility of resulting persecution. As their Master spoke they were well aware of the importance of the Kingdom and the place which it must hold in their lives. This was no part time job, nor could it be secondary in their lives. The Kingdom demanded their whole-hearted surrender, their deepest loyalty and true devotion. The words of their leader left no doubt as to that—"Seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and his righteousness"—Matt. 6:33.

The Biblical Basis:

Matt. 5:1-12; 7:24-27
—These two passages mark the beginning and the conclusion of the portion of scripture we term the Sermon on the Mount. All that lies between ought to be read as a part of this week's study.

In Matt. 5:1-12 we have the verses which we know as 'The Beatitudes' or 'Blesseds'. At first reading we tend to think in terms of several different kinds of people—"poor in spirit", "merciful", "pure in heart" and others mentioned. Perhaps we would come to a clearer concept of what it means to be a Christian if we would look upon the Beatitudes as describing the attributes that go to make up a Christian character. Every heart is searching for happiness. Jesus is here pointing out the way to its attainment. It is not an easy way but true happiness and peace of mind is worthy of sacrifice.

In Matt. 7:24-27 Jesus tells his audience by means of the parable of the Two Builders that it is not enough to listen with reverent approval, keen appreciation, and stirred emotions. His words demanded action. They must not only hear but obey. To do the things of which he spoke was the mark of a wise man.

The Application:

- This lesson challenges us to:
1. Read the Sermon on the Mount again.
 2. Meditate upon its truth.
 3. Examine ourselves by its standards.
 4. Confess our shortcomings.
 5. Pray for forgiveness.
 6. Reconsecrate ourselves to Christ and His Kingdom.

"Matthew, therefore, gives us, in the Beatitudes, and in the rest of these chapters, the kind of material that a Christian man must build into his house of life."

"Here are the qualities" their Master said to them "by which you can build a new character, a new world, my kingdom of brotherly relationships."

"To be poor in spirit does not mean self-contempt. It is to be humble, childlike, teachable, ready to lean upon a higher power."

"Blessed is the man that shows with Jesus the pain and anguish of a world gone wrong. It must be a grief that sends us out to share with Jesus in his efforts to save the world."

"The meek man is Christ's real gentleman and these are his marks:
1. He is considerate of others.
2. He has a sweet temper.
3. He is humble minded.
4. He is courageous.
5. He is strong in character.
"God has placed in every one of us an insatiable hunger for himself."

"Mercifulness is primarily a thing of the inner life. It is a disposition of the soul. It is to be possessed of a forgiving spirit. It is to have a heart of pity and compassion. It is to have Christ's way of looking at men."
