fill the churches and Sunday
Schools, delinquent and boozery
gangs would disappear. There must
be a returning to God or else con-
ditions will go on from bad to
worse. The wisdom of man has
put the world in the condition it is
in and man is not wise enough to
bring it back. Only the grace of
God can do that.
