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The Editor's Corner

SOME INCOME TAX REMINDERS

Mr. Gordon-McIntock, former bank manager here, has given us some pertinent information about income tax which we pass on for the benefit of readers, many of whom will be in this category. Last spring, those who had paid compulsory savings along with their 1942 income tax were sent refund cheques which included the amount of compulsory savings plus interest at 2 per cent. This interest, Mr. McIntock says, is subject to income tax and should be added to your 1948 income when drawing up the statement. Refund cheques for 1943-44 will shortly be in the mail and the interest on these will be part of your 1949 income, so it will be well to make a note of this at the time to save future trouble with the tax department.

There is one type of interest which is tax free and that is on war saving certificates. When you cash a savings certificate, you receive five dollars for each four dollars originally subscribed. No record need be kept of this as the interest is exempt from tax. Savings Bonds, of course, are in another category and interest received is taxable. If a Savings Bond is cashed, the difference between what you paid for the bond and what you receive is accrued interest and is taxable. Our Victory Bonds, when sold at a price above par are taxable only for this accrued interest. The amount of the price above par is considered a capital gain and cannot be taxed.

Income tax, incidentally is due to be paid by the 30th of April, and to avoid last minute headaches, it is wise to allow ample time to make out one's tax forms and have everything in order well before this date. Don't forget that church contributions may be deducted from total income for tax purposes, and there are allowances made for those having large medical expenditures in the year.

ANOTHER HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP

Congratulations are in order this week to the Raiders, who on Saturday captured championship honours in what is always the cream of the Intermediate hockey groupings in this section of the country. This is the second championship already this year for the Raiders, who possess the Tost Memorial Cup for winning a pre-season group with Acton, Weston and Oakville. League competition this year was more exciting, inasmuch as the teams seemed to be on a more even basis and no one had an unbroken string of wins as Georgetown did last year. A disappointment was the poor showing of Acton Tanners, who are always counted on to extend Georgetown to the limit, and this year fluttered to a feeble ending in two straight games by lopsided scores. Bridgeport proved of different calibre and were worthy contenders for play-off honours. To beat an equally good team adds spice to victory and the Raiders should be "highly seasoned" after Saturday night.
