We have a recreational director! The GRC recommended and Municipal Council approved the appointment of Rev. J. Leonard Self as director of Georgetown's recreational activities. Mr. Self, who is minister of Norval and Union Presbyterian Churches, has wide experience in many sports, teaching, playground work and the general organization of recreation. This experience has been gained in many centres across Canada and we in Georgetown are fortunate that Mr. Self will help us to enjoy a fuller life by the exercise of our own talents and capabilities. It is a tremendous job that he has undertaken, and if we the people of the community will support him with heart, muscle and brain, he is confident that Georgetown will rank foremost in this country as a happy, healthy town in which to raise a family.

G.R.C. HOCKEY

An abbreviated three-week hockey schedule has been planned by Georgetown Recreational Committee under the new recreational director, Rev. J. L. Self. Three leagues will operate - Bantams (8-10); Midgets (11-13) and Juveniles (14-16). All ages are as of January 1st this year. Bantam and midget teams have already been picked and at a meeting in the arena at 4 p.m. today, captains and teams for four juvenile teams will be chosen. Several local men have offered to coach teams, but at least ten more are needed immediately, for this Friday night when the first games will be played. The GRC has been given the use of the arena from 7 to 11 p.m. Mr. Self is asking fathers to attend with their boys and hopes this will be a Father and Son night. Schedules for future games will be released that night.

The Bantams will play starting at 6:45 and games scheduled are Hornets vs. Barons, Reds vs. Flyers and Bears vs. Bisons, in that order. At 8 p.m. the Midgets take over, with another three games, Rangers vs. Canadiens, Hawks vs. Red Wings and Bruins vs. Maple Leafs. The Juveniles will play from 9:45.

A set of rules, drawn up for the league, are:

1. Bantam and midget games are three 10-minute periods; juveniles, three 15-minute periods, all straight time.
2. Any fighting, deliberate rough play, might bring a one or more game suspension.
3. No smoking in the Arena by players.
4. Any abusive language or swearing might bring suspension.
5. There is no charge for players.
6. Marshall Timbers is in charge of time-keeping for all games.
7. Referees will be paid 25c a game for bantam and midget, 35c for juvenile. Any volunteers are asked to phone 382r2 immediately.
8. Referees shall listen only to protest of captains and coaches.
9. Any players not listed who wish to play, phone 382r2.

Mrs. Sarah Young Dies After Lengthy Illness

A resident of Georgetown since 1909, Mrs. Sidney Young passed away at her home on James Street on Thursday, March 17th, after a lengthy illness. Mrs. Young was before her marriage, Sarah Young, a daughter of the late James Young and Jane Wright. She was born in Toronto 46 years ago and after her marriage lived with her husband in the Scotch Block. In 1888 they moved to Milton and in 1909 they moved to Georgetown, where Mr. Young died fifteen years ago. A member of St. George's Church of England, she had been an active member of the Women's Auxiliary until failing health curtailed her activities.

Mrs. Young leaves a family of two daughters and one son, Georgina of Georgetown, Mrs. W. I. Dick (Margaret) of Milton, wife of the Halton Crown Attorney and Ernest H. Young of North Bay. There are eight grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren. She was the last surviving member of her family.

The funeral service from her home on Saturday was conducted by Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson. Pallbearers were four nephews, Kenneth Dick, Sidney Dick, James Dick and Wallace Young, and two nephews by marriage, Kenneth Gibbs of Oshawa and Kenneth Marshall of Milton. Interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.
