#### Comments on the Lesson by Rev. John. M. Smith

SUNDAY, APRIL 3rd

TURNING TOWARDS THE CROSS

In this week's lesson we find Jesus journeying with his disciples in the vicinity of Caesarea Philippi. Here they became aware of their Master's Messiahship, and although they found it difficult to understand they discovered that this Mesdahship was vastly different from that of which their contemporaries dreamed and for which they had hoped. Not only were they amazed at his strange predictions of Kingdom but also at his announce ment of his suffering and death and his great challenge for self-denial as a mark of discipleship. They could not yet-fathom the deep significance of the words . "Whosover will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up the cross, and follow me." - Mark 8.34 - but they realized that to follow the Christ was not going to be easy. He glory and ease, but a cross of selfdenial.

The Biblical Basis: Mark 8:27-34 Luke 9:28-35, 51 The Marcan passage gives us report of the high-light experience of the Caesarea Philippi journey in which Jesus asks the question "Who do men say that I am?" Their answer indicated that he held no mean reputation. The man in the street ascribed to him the distinction of being an extraordinary person with a divine connection and a divine mission. It was not a difficult thing for people who held a him as John the Baptist, Elijah, or one of the prophets come back from the dead. Being steeped in the Messianic hope that the Messiah would appear in great pomp and power, overthrowing the Jews' earthly enemies and setting up the People, they could hardly proclaim him as the Lord's Anointed. It remained for Peter, although he must have spoken in some bowilderment out of conflicting Messianic concepto declare "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God." This was another way of saying Thou art the off-promised, longawaited Messiah." It was then that Jesus, accepting the great declaration, revealed to his followers the rejection, death and resurrection of path of his messiahship. That they did not understand was evident in Peter's kindly and well intended rebuke. It was not yet clear to them that the Kingdom must come through the "suffering servant" attitude rather than the glorious and pompous victory of armies and power. It seemed necessary for Jesus to emphasize once again the condition of discipleship - self denial. The verses chosen from the

9th Chapter of Luke give us a picture of Jesus drawing apart with a few of his disciples to offer prayer and to meditate upon his mission. Here they saw Jesus as they never say him before - he appeared in a new glory that surpassed that of the two great characters of Israel, Moses the law-giver, and Elijah, the prophet. In the presence of the Christ at prayer, the transfigured Jesus - the disciples were assured of his messiahship and encouraged in their faith. The voice of God spoke to them in no uncertain terms "This is my beloved Son; hear him.".

The Application:

In this age of numerous "isms" and multiple interpretations . of Christianity, this lesson "challenges us to self examination. We would do well to:-

(1) Examine our faith - What dld not offer them quick triumph, do we think of Christ? In spite of varied opinions our faith such that we with Peter can make the tremendous declaration "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God?" (2) To see the significance of his wicarious living and vicarious dying - to grasp the meaning of the

"suffering servant" and "the cross." (3) To be constantly on our guard lest we like Peter momentarily lose sight of the Divine Will and purpose and see only the selfcentred aims of men. (4) To examine our living over

against the great condition of discipleship - self denial: Think of belief'in reincarnation to look upon this over against our common tendencies to self-gratification, selfcommendation, self pity, self-evaluation and self-assertion.

(5) To so live that we can behold the glory of Christ and hear the voice of God saying "This is my beloved Son," hear Him."
