### HARVEST NEWS

These days we hear a great deal about fires. The other day a farmer paid me for his new tractor I happened to remark it was quite a price. He agreed with me, but said he was very grateful that he had the money to pay for it. He reminded me of the last one he purchased in 1934. At that time he had to buy it in instalments over a period of thirty-six months. Today it was more money but he had the cash to pay for it, and he was happy.

The other day I read an article on prices and profits by John L. McCaffery, president of International Harvester, part of which is as follows:

"Let's say that we decided to work for our customers for nothing—to receive no profit. (This won't happen because we don't want to go out of business, and we don't think our customers want us to).

"But, let's say we had eliminated our 1948 profit on a dollar of sales. We would also have eliminated the amount which in 1948 we paid to the government for income taxes. Not having any income, we naturally would pay no income tax. What would that have done to prices? It would have enabled us to lower our prices a few cents on the dollar. The net result would be this: If we had worked for nothing in 1948 and cut our prices accordingly, and paid no income tax, the user of our equipment would have saved only \$02.00 on a Harvester product which retailed at \$1,000.00.

"What it all boils down to is this: the real hope for lower prices has to be lower costs of production and distribution. We are doing everything we can to reduce those costs, but frankly the odds are against us.
