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Hello Homemakers! You can freshen up the house without creating a cloud of dust if you use a vacuum cleaner. It's a big help on the major housecleaning jobs. The attachments are easily interchanged and go into action at the flip of a switch for such protective measures as demoting, deodorizing, and polishing.

This is the time of year you may be seriously considering buying or renting one. Since there are two types of vacuum cleaners and many different kinds of each type, you may be in a quandary as to which you should select. Let your furnishings be the deciding factor. If you have soft, high-piled rugs and an extensive amount of hardwood floors, you will want a straight air cleaner. It has the long tube attachment which cleans mattresses and does extra dusting at the same time. Carpets and hard rugs respond more effectively to the agitator type of vacuum with a motor driven brush-action. With either type, it is wise to purchase the attachments and make good use of them, according to directions.

TAKE A TIP

Features to look for in vacuum cleaner value:

1. A quiet motor and fan action with little vibration.
2. Ease of changing attachments.
3. A conveniently located power switch.
4. A free action handle on the upright model and well designed runners on tank model.
5. A durable cord with brackets to wind it on.
6. Soft bumpers on three sides of the nozzle or sweeper to prevent marring the furniture.
7. A lamp at the base with a wide angle to provide light under the furniture and help you to see pins.
8. Check on the convenience of maintenance (some have sealed-in lubrication and require no oiling).
9. A reputable company which guarantees its product.
10. The dust receptacle should be easily removable (some have a foot operated dirt ejector).

THE QUESTION BOX

Mrs. J. T. asks:
How can black marks made by rubber heels on linoleum be removed?
Answer:
Cleaning fluid such as a spot remover for clothes should take it off. Some liquid cleansers, such as those for cleaning woodwork, also do a good job. If you don't happen to have any of these, the floor can be rubbed lightly with steel wool.

Mrs. S. W. asks:
Does scrubbing linoleum with a brush ruin this material?
Answer:
Vigorous scrubbing and too much water used on linoleum will soon deteriorate it.

Mrs. R. M. asks:
How often should a floor be waxed?
Answer:
No set rule can be applied to all households, because of the difference in family life. If there are small children and a dog the floor will get ground-in soil that will require thorough washing and a complete new covering once a week. In other cases go over the floor lightly with a mop wrung out tight of soapy water, then a clean mop wrung out of clean water and leave the wax for 2 or 3 weeks.

CHARLIE DYER SHOOTS POSSIBLE

Sixty years ago a rifle association was formed in Hillsburgh and the diamond jubilee of this organization has just been celebrated there. Moreover it is a recent shoot which marked the occasion, the only contestant making a possible 9x-100 score was 80-year-old Charlie Dyer. There were crack shots from Guelph, Georgetown, Fergus and other points in this competition. The veteran's great showing received the acclaim of all the other contestants. He was the only one who had taken part in the first meet of the club in 1889.

Nearest approach to Dyer's century was the 99 showing of Harvey Nurse of Georgetown. Next highest came two Hillsburgh contestants, Mercer Jackson, 98 and George Elenton, 97. Frank Morwick, O.A.C., followed with 96. None of the 28 contestants scored under 90.

The origin of this famous club dates back to November, 1888, when a group of young men met at S. S. No. 5, Garafraxa, on a Saturday afternoon to have a rifle match. Charlie Dyer appeared with a new single-shot Winchester 32-20. There was also a Winchester model 1873, 32-20, and a Remington 45. Each shooter was to fire three shots at a target with a two inch bull's-eye at 100 yards. The lad with the 45 Remington won first prize. Only two of the eight competitors are still living. They are Charlie Dyer and his brother Joe of Guelph.

So began the regular Saturday afternoon shoots. Eight joined from Caledon and there were others from Erin Township, Alton and Marsville, bringing the membership up to 20. Inter-township matches were organized with matches at Marsville, Orangeville and other points. Sides shot off for who would pay for the oyster supper at 25c a plate and funds were raised by subscriptions for individual prizes.

Hillsburgh became the place for regular matches which became very keen after the turn of the century at 36 and 40 yards offhand and 50 to 100 yards from a rest. Shots for chickens, geese and turkeys kept the club a going concern.

Addition Planned for Peel - Halton Home

Plans are well under way for the construction of a new wing at the Peel-Halton Home on No. 10 Highway near Brampton. The joint committee, composed of representatives from both counties will hold a meeting this Friday and it is expected that tenders will be called shortly after that.

Architects Shore and Moffat of Toronto have prepared a long-range expansion program. The initial building program will provide a 34-bed dormitory for women and a new boiler house and heating system. The dormitory will be located at the southeast corner of the present premises, and will be joined to the main building by a ramp. Provision is made for a similar building for men at the north-east corner at a future date.

The long-term plan also calls for building a two storey structure for use of married couples. There would be small suites, with meals served in the main dining room. The new women's quarters will be in a one-storey building. No cost estimate is available; but both Peel

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
