Raiders Must Win Three Games for Championship

Sundridge Takes Two Week-End Games — Lever Stars in Net — Play Tonight in Bracebridge.

Sundridge took two close games over the week-end to give them a definite edge in the play-downs for the Intermediate "B" championship. The score now stands 3-1 in games. The teams meet tonight in Bracebridge and a win gives Sundridge the title. If Raiders win, the next game will be at the Georgetown Arena on Friday.

Raiders kept a goal ahead until the last period in Bracebridge on Saturday, when they tired and allowed goals by Rennie and Christie to put the home team ahead 5-4. Chappel opened the scoring early in the first with H. Kidd tallying for Sundridge, then Currie and L. Bradbury combining for Georgetown's second goal. H. Hill tied it up again in the second, then came a highlight when, with Junior Beaumont and Currie both in the penalty box, Kent Storey snared a loose puck off Buck McDonald's skate and scored for the Raiders. Sedore added another for Sundridge and Raiders forged ahead again on an effort by L. Bradbury, Chappel and D. Beaumont. Goalie Fred Lever was struck in the eye by a flying puck in the second, but came back to continue his stellar performance.

Lever was a tower of strength on Monday at the Georgetown rink, when Sundridge definitely had the edge on the play for most of the game and he can be thanked for keeping the score at 3-2. Buck McDonald scored the winning goal in the last period. Lever was yanked in the last minute, but a furious offensive with six men up failed to garner a goal for the hard-working Raiders. Storey and Kemshead got the Georgetown goals. H. Hill and Christie tallied for Sundridge, the second goal being scored when Raiders were two men short.

Pat Patterson and Ab Grant tooted the whistles in Georgetown; Farrell and Dobson were in charge at Bracebridge.

High School District Will Be Discussed

Georgetown Board of Education will meet with Mr. Duffin of the Dept. of Education next Wednesday night to discuss high schools districts and the future status of secondary education in town. The meeting will be held in the High School and members of the council have been invited to sit in with the board on the discussion.

At last Wednesday's meeting of the board, M. H. Moyer, attendance officer, reported on his work to date. There have been no bad cases of truancy, he said, and he had received good cooperation from parents who have been contacted. It was reported that from time to time, beer bottles had been found on the public school grounds by the caretaker, and the board instructed the secretary to contact the police for a patrol of the grounds in order that this may cease.

The commercial course, inaugurated last year at the high school will be continued. It has been successful and several students have already taken positions in local offices. The board will also investigate the possibility of holding night classes at the school. A \$100 yearly cost of living bonus paid last year to members of the high school staff was renewed and extended to cover public school teachers as well.

The board is advertising for a teacher for the new room at the public school and applications will be reviewed at the board meeting next Wednesday.

Crown Attorney Dick Retires After 45 Years in Office

William I. Dick, K.C., dean of Crown Attorneys in Ontario, announced his retirement from office effective March 31st, after serving the county in this position for 45 years.

Mr. Dick will not retire from active practice, but will continue as senior partner with his son Kenneth in the legal firm of Dick and Dick.

Graduating from Osgoode Hall in 1892, Mr. Dick first practiced law in Brampton, where his father edited the Brampton Banner. He later moved to Milton to continue his practice and later received his appointment as Crown Attorney.

Mr. Dick is married to the former Margaret Young, a sister of Miss Georgina Young of Georgetown. During his term of office there have been no serious outbreaks of crime in the county. There was only one murder trial and the jury brought in a verdict of manslaughter. Recently he prosecuted during the trials of two of the Campbellville robbers. He recalls that during his early days as crown attorney, there was no official court reporter and he often had to act as his own shorthand reporter.

No appointment of a successor has yet been announced.

Former Banker in Georgetown Al Cameron Promoted

Al Cameron, who was formerly a member of the Bank of Montreal staff in Georgetown, has received a promotion from assistant accountant to accountant at the bank branch in Peterborough. He has been in Peterborough for two years and before that was at Kincardine. Besides his banking duties as a member of a staff of 46, Mr. Cameron is active in community affairs. He is treasurer of the Lions Club and secretary-treasurer of the Civic Arena Committee. For his work during the arena campaign, he was given a life-time pass to the building.

ESQUESING PIONEER, JOHN L. LESLIE DIES

A pioneer resident of Esquesing Township, John Lyon Leslie died in Guelph General Hospital on Wednesday morning, April 13th, from complications resulting from a fall in which he had suffered a broken hip.

He was the son of the late James and Margaret Leslie and was born 86 years ago at Lot 16, concession 4, Esquesing. He farmed there continuously until moving to Georgetown in 1918. He was married in 1888 to Mary A. Thornton, daughter of Edwin and Catherine Thornton, and they had a family of five children, four sons, Blake, Edwin (who was killed at the battle of the Somme in 1916), Dean and George, and one daughter, Mrs. K. C. Lindsay (Isabel). He is also survived by an only sister, Mrs. T. J. Leslie (Cassie), of Ingersoll.

The funeral, conducted by Rev. Alex Calder, took place from the McClure Funeral Home on Friday afternoon. Four grandsons, Donald, Bruce and Bob Lindsay and Ted Leslie and two nephews, Joel Leslie and Roy Gordon acted as pallbearers. Interment was made in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery.

Met for half an hour, for payment of accounts, and reading of correspondence, and adjourned for the hockey game, with a special meeting set for the next night.

ON TUESDAY, APRIL 19

Filled three tenders for garbage collection for future consideration. (Moved by Herbert and Goodlet) Tenders were received from Lane's Haulage, \$3,000; Norman Snyder, \$2,600; William Brasby, \$2,500. Lane's Haulage, who hold the contract at present will automatically keep the contract according to the resolution.

Accepted a tender from Cecil Smith for the fencing of the sewage disposal plant property at an estimated cost of \$1450. (Moved by McNally and Davidson).

Established a mileage allowance of 10c for use of his own truck by the town foreman. Mr. Hyde, who had been receiving \$5 a week for this, said that he found it difficult to continue under this system and that he thought a mileage allowance would be fairer. (Moved by Armstrong and Goodlet).

Deputy-Reeve Goodlet quoted a press report of the last council meeting in which Cr. Lyons was quoted as saying, in answer to criticism by Mr. Goodlet of \$297 spent for drilling an extra water hole at the park, that it was "just as good a bargain as the \$80,000" passed for water improvements by last year's council. Mr. Goodlet said he objected to this as a reflection on the 1948 council and demanded a public apology. Mayor Gibbons said that if Mr. Lyons wished to make a statement it was alright, but that it was not council's place to rule on a private dispute. Council could accept Mr. Goodlet's statement, but he could not allow a debate on a matter which council could not decide.

Cr. Lyons reported that the best way to clear up poor drainage conditions in the properties at the rear of Georgetown Motors was to tile along George Street, down Draper and into the storm sewer on James. Estimated cost would be \$225, and the drain would be taken to the street line by property owners at their own expense. Council favoured doing this.

Cr. Lyons also mentioned that he had had a complaint about trees planted on town property at the corner of Main and Factory Streets and suggested council look at these. A decision was deferred until this was done.

Will have Engineer C. R. Hagey investigate certain difficulties which hamper operation of the disposal plant.

Were informed that the Board of Transport Commissioners will meet in the Municipal Building on Tuesday, April 26th at 10.30 a.m. for a hearing on the John Street subway.

Were informed by the CNR that their property terminates at the northerly right of way of St. Michael Street and that no further action is contemplated by them in fixing the street entrance. Council will contact Provincial Paper, Ltd., who agreed to take care of this when the town granted permission for an extension of the railway siding which interfered with this street.

Authorized the police committee to discuss with the Provincial Police measures for more satisfactory policing in Georgetown.
