The pastor's text for Sunday morning was found in John 12:32. The words of Christ when he said, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me. Jesus was lifted up on the cross. There are two spirits in the world, the earth spirit of greed, grasping, selfish and personal ambition, and the spirit of sacrifice, unselfishness and service. This last spirit Jesus lived. Christ could be lifted up before the world if his followers had faith enough to lift them above the earth spirit. We cannot lift people higher than we are ourselves. The crucifixion came because Christ so completely broke with the earth spirit. The resurrection proved that in a universe created by God, the spirit cannot be defeated.

To be lifted up from the earth, means to place spiritual things above material things. The earth spirit says, "I will indulge in anything where I find pleasure." The Christ spirit says, "I will not indulge in anything that is a bad example. Pilate lacked the Christ spirit when he found no fault in Christ and sacrificed his own convictions to satisfy the crowd. When Christ speaks to us, may we heed it even if we have to stand alone.

Rhubarb Juice: Cover diced clean rhubarb with water; add the usual amount of sugar and cook quickly. Strain liquid in a pitcher, add a few drops of colouring and chill before serving.

Easter Ham: Bake a half ham, skin side up in an open roasting pan without water in a slow electric oven of 325 degrees. Allow 22 minutes per pound. (5 mins. per lb. more if ham is taken directly from refrigerator.) Skin, score, stud with whole cloves and spread with one third cup brown sugar mixed with 1 tsp. dry mustard. Brown in a hot oven (400 degrees) 15 to 20 minutes basting several times with drippings.

Mustard Sauce: Mix together in double boiler: 1 1/2 tbsps. dry mustard, 2 tbsps. white sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt and 2 tbsps. flour. Stir in 2 tbsps. vinegar and 1/2 cup cold water. Add 6 tbsps. margarine, 3 beaten egg yolks and 1/2 cup cream and stir until thickened. Then remove from element and mix in 3 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce and another 1/2 cup cream. Before serving stir in 2 tbsps. chopped chives.

Cress Salad: Wash and trim water-cress of white roots. Cut in 2 inch pieces to make 4 cups and add 3 mixed hard cooked eggs. Toss together with French dressing.

Brown Rolls: Dissolve 1 pkg. yeast granules in 1/2 cup lukewarm water. Into 1 cup scalded, cool milk, 1/2 cup warm water, stir 1/4 cup molasses and 1/2 tsp. salt; then add yeast and mix in sufficient flour (4 cups graham flour) to make a soft dough. Add 2 tbsps. melted shortening and beat well. Mix in another 1/2 cup flour to make a slack dough but not sticky. Turn out on floured board and knead 30 times. Place in large greased bowl, cover with tea towel and let rise until double in bulk. Then punch down and snip off pieces with scissors, roll and place in greased muffin pans. Let rise again 1/2 size. Then bake immediately in hot electric oven of 425 degrees for 15 minutes.

Easter Nest Dessert: Dissolve a package of cherry jello and pour into individual round moulds or in a round glass dish. Chill until firm in the electric refrigerator. Then turn individual moulds on serving plates, or use doughnut cutter and egg lifter to transfer circles of jelly to flat plates. Fill the centres with balls of cheese rolled in coconut and green maraschino cherries.

Oatmeal Cookies: Mix together 1/2 cup shortening, 1 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. salt, 1 cup chopped raisins, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 tsp. soda dissolved in 1 tbsps. hot water, 2 cups coarse oatmeal and 1 1/2 cups pastry flour. Drop batter from spoon into greased baking sheet. Bake in electric oven at 400 degrees for 20 minutes.

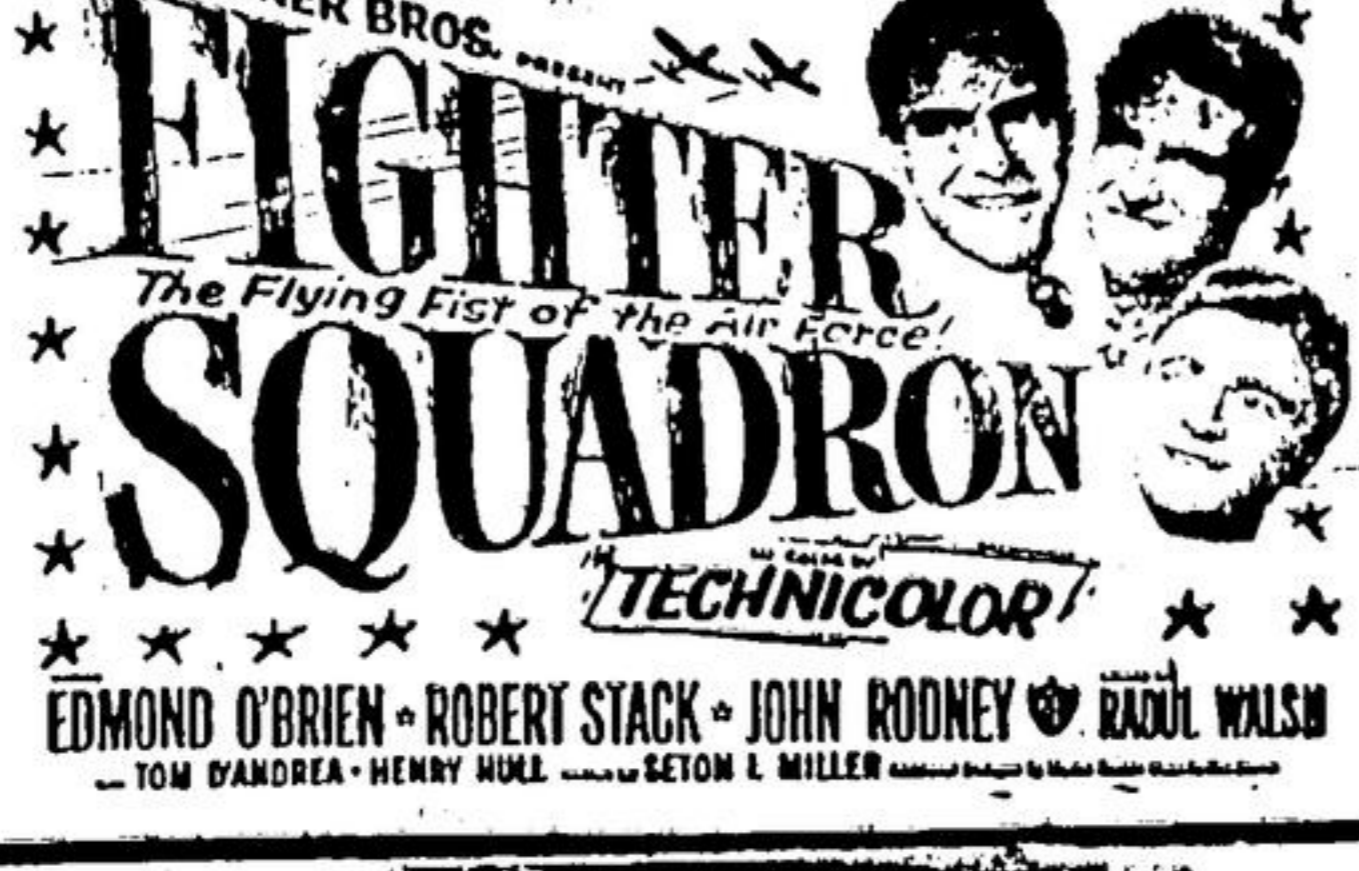
