LIONS WILL SPONSOR FOOD FOR BRITAIN TAG DAY

Taggers will be on Georgetown streets a week from Saturday for the annual appeal for the Lions Food for Britain fund. This international campaign, undertaken for the past few years by Lions Clubs all over Canada is for the purpose of raising funds for purchase of food parcels for families in Britain. A number of letters received from grateful people in Manchester, England, to whom parcels were sent from the Georgetown club last year, attest to the value of this good will gesture to the people in Britain.

Among letters received were ones from a lady of 84 and a man of 90; a thankful note from a retired hospital sister, who suffers from arthritis and shared her parcel with her sister who lives with her; another from a mother who said the food was used to augment rations for a party on her daughter's eleventh birthday; still another which pointed out how pleasing it was to add to rations which included only 1 lb of chocolates and sweets a month, and to taste tinned tongue and salmon which were almost unobtainable.

The tag day is convened by a committee headed by Marshal Timbers, and the Lions Club is hoping that there will be a generous response from the public to this worthy cause.

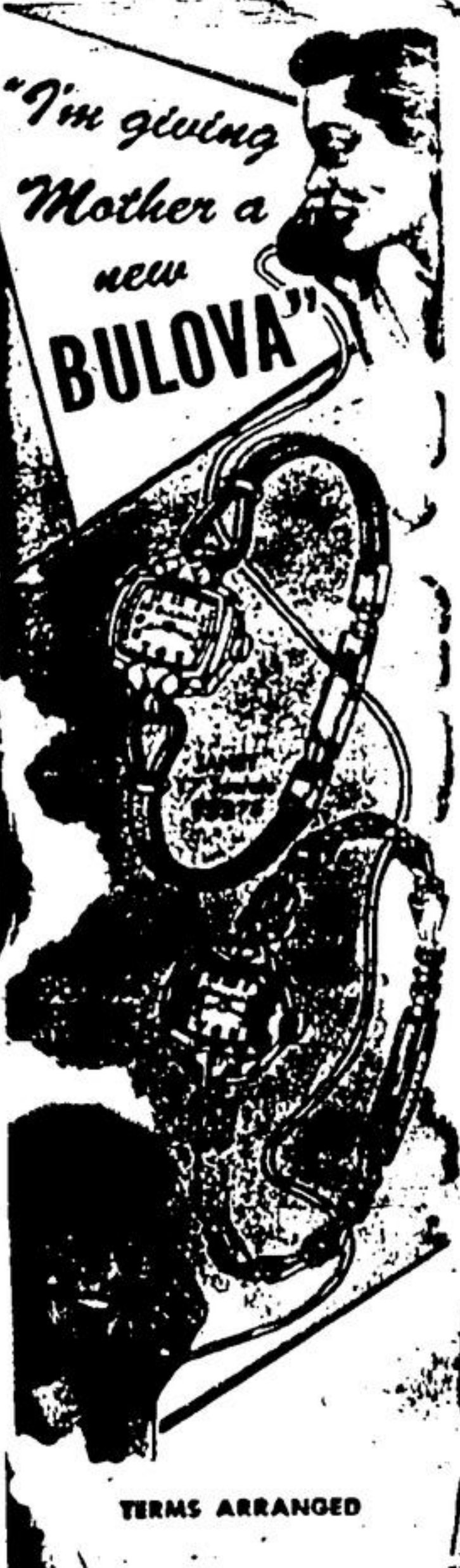
