Paul discovered the weakness of the ceremonial law. Paul according to law before his conversion was a good man. One day conviction came to him that the law had failed to satisfy the yearning of his soul. It is a great day in a man's life when he realizes the weakness of his moral life.

It is good when a man realizes he cannot conquer self in his own strength. It takes a power greater than ourselves. Paul said; When I am weak then I am strong. When in himself he could do nothing, the power of God was present and he had victory. It is a wonderful thing to have hold of a power greater than ourselves, by which to conquer our own nature. This is the Law that makes men free.

At the evening service the pastor's theme was: The Tragedy and Triumph of the human will. The tragedy of the human will is found in John 5:40. The words of Jesus when he said; and ye will not come to me that ye might have life. The tragedy of the human race today is that they will not come to Christ. The triumph of the human will is found in John 7:17. If any man will do his will he shall know of the doctrine. They who yield their wills to the will of God, shall know the power of salvation. To attain Eternal life rests on our own will. The bible teaches that nothing can shut the door of heaven against us, but our own refusal. There is no bar to our salvation, but what resides in our own heart. Woe to the man who is at peace and at the same time is a sinner against God. Jesus said: He that cometh to me I will in nowise cast out. This promise is great enough to save every sinner and yet of no value if you do not come to Christ.
