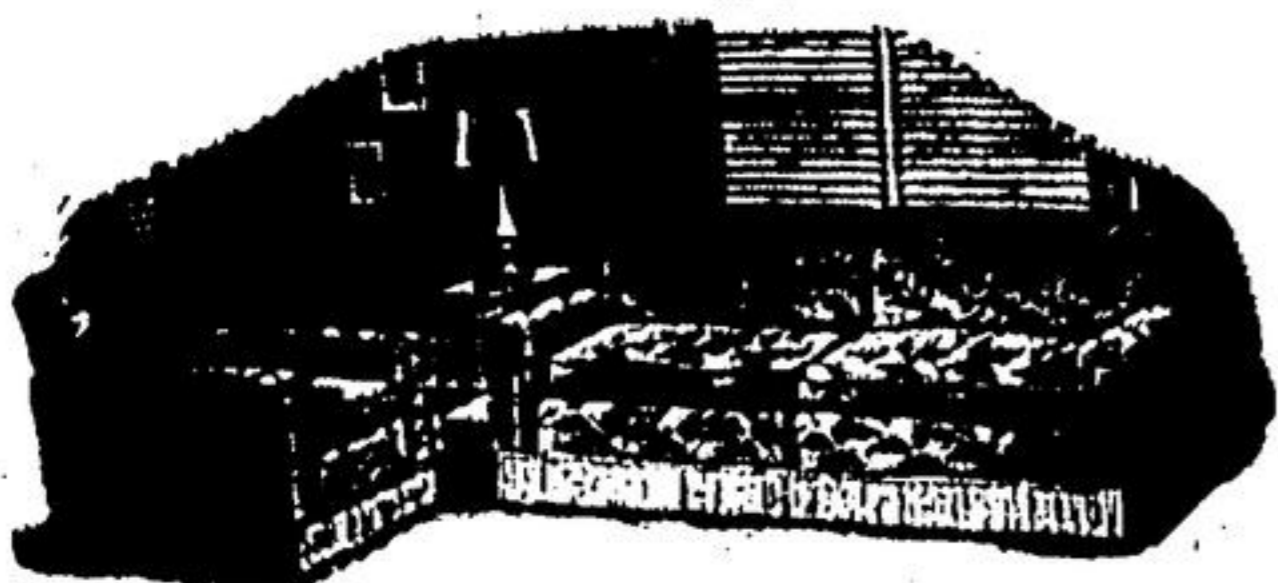

MEAGHER HOLSTEIN MAKES 100,000 LBS. MILK IN FIVE LACTATIONS

One of the few Holstein cows to make 100,000 lbs. milk in five lactations is Butter Maid Lealand owned by Graymar Farms, Oakville, who has produced in her first five lactations 101808 lbs. milk containing 3493 lbs. fat. "Maid" started on test as a two-year-old and made her fifth record as an eight-year-old. Her two largest records were made at five and six years when she produced 837 and 830 lbs. fat respectively. Two of her records were made on twice-a-day milking and the other three on three times-a-day milking.

"Maid" has been classified as "Very Good" in Selective Registration. She was 1st prize milking four-year-old, Senior and Grand Champion at the Halton County Black and White Show in 1944.
