Miss Ellen Weedmark Explains Health Unit Work to Ladies' Group

Miss Ellen Weedmark, public health nurse on the Halton Health Unit Staff, was a guest at the April meeting of the Local Council of Women and gave a talk on the work being done by the Unit. She mentioned the need of a welfare council, which would eventually come. In addition to her work at public and high schools, she visits homes where there are new babies, instructs mothers in bathing and fixing formulas.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. A. Reeve, Arlita St., on Friday, April 22nd. Flowers were ordered sent to Mrs. Horbert Bessey, who has been quite ill in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton. Miss Hettie Lawson read a communication from the National Council of Women, entitled "Moral Standards," in which the following "Ten Commandments for Parents" were outlined:

1. Warn the children against talking to strange men.
2. Warn them against accepting from strangers, money or comics, candy or ice-cream.
3. Warn them against being shown a house or street number or garage somewhere.
4. Do not allow them out alone after dark and always to return in groups of three or four and with an older child.
5. Teach them not to loiter home from school in the early darkness of winter days.
6. Advise them to report any peculiar behaviour of men loitering about schools or other suspicious neighbourhoods.
7. Advise them to discuss with you any peculiar behaviour towards them of older boys and men at school or other associations.
8. If possible, restrict the child's freedom to daylight hours, and to report home at regular intervals, thus learning the art of self-protection.
9. Warn the child, that you will never send a stranger to bring it home from any place. It will always be someone it knows.

10. Accept as your own responsibility the duty of reporting immediately to the Police, all information, clues or any evidence of mauling, molestation of children you hear of or even suspect. Don't lose a minute! That minute may mean the difference between catching or losing the culprit.

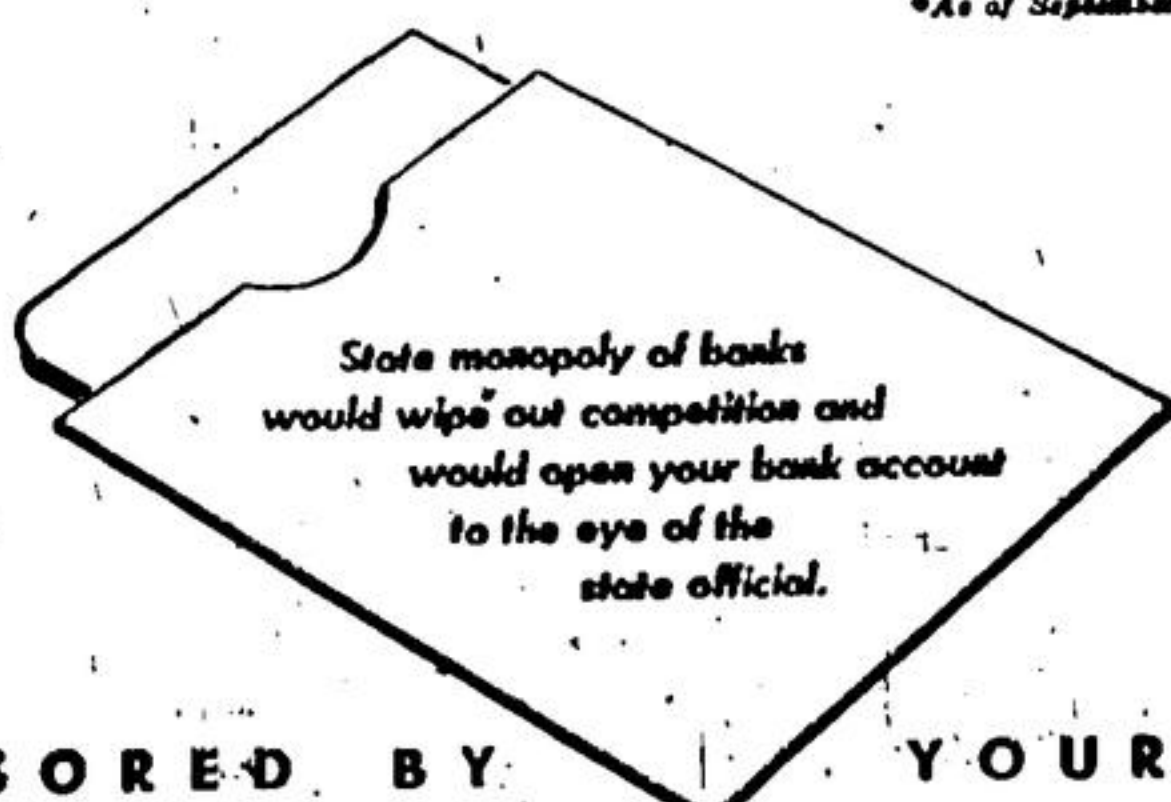
