**Rev. F. Dunlop Retiring,  
 New Minister at Norval**

Ending a pastorate of seven years in the Norval Charge of the United Church, Rev. F. J. Dunlop has announced his retirement from the ministry and will preach his farewell sermons on the last Sunday in June at the churches in Norval, Glen Williams and Mount Pleasant which comprise the Charge. He will be succeeded by Rev. Alexander F. Cowan, who has been extended a call and has indicated his willingness to accept.

Mr. Cowan, who is a graduate of Victoria College and Emmanuel College, was ordained in 1944, and served in the Alberta Conference at Rockyford and Rowley before moving to Toronto where for the last year he has been assistant minister at Ruthymede United Church. He is married and the father of a small daughter. It is expected he will be inducted the last week in June and take over his official duties the first week in July.

Mr. and Mrs. Dunlop expect to make their home in the city, where their daughter, Miss Helen Dunlop is employed in the offices of the Workmen's Compensation Board. They came to Norval from the Laurel and Campana United Churches in the Orangeville district, where Mr. Dunlop was minister for thirteen years. Prior to that he had served the church at Copple Cliff, Queensville, King and Thornton, where Mrs. Dunlop, a granddaughter of Rev. Leonard Hill, an early "saddle back" Methodist minister, came to the parsonage as a bride. Their son, John, who is married to the former Jean Laidlaw of Norval, makes his home in Barrie, where he is employed with the Hill, Clarke Francis Co. and they have a baby son.

Mr. Dunlop has been active in fraternal work and is widely known through his connection with the Masonic and Orange Orders. He is a past grand master of the Grand Black Chapter of Ontario West and a past deputy Grand Master of the

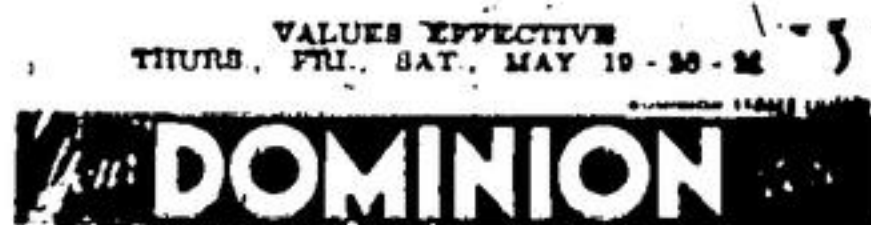
