### Board of Education Votes to Join North Halton High School District

Georgetown Board of Education decided at their meeting last Wednesday night to recommend to town Council that Georgetown join the North Halton High School District. The decision came after several meetings at which the matter had been fully discussed, including a meeting with G. L. Duffin, Executive Assistant Secondary Schools Branch, Dept. of Education. Influencing the decision were such facts as Mr. Duffin's statement that the Department had changed its mind about the wisdom of locating central schools in the country and now favoured all schools being located in urban municipalities, the continuing higher costs of attempting to operate a local school with no support in financing or student attendance from the surrounding countryside, and a statement by the commercial inspector that it wasn't economically sound to continue to operate a commercial course at the school for a small number of students.

John Bell and Ross Duncan, who form the High School District committee of the Board were appointed by the chairman, Walter Biehn, to present the board's findings to the town council at their meeting on Monday night. A final decision on the matter is up to town council, who, if they approve, must in turn forward the recommendation to county council. The earliest date that Georgetown can be included in the district is January 1st, 1950, and to enter by that time the county council must accept Georgetown's entry before July 1st of this year.

### BAPTIST CHURCH HIGHLIGHTS

The pastor took his text from Ecclesiastes 1:7. Solomon, the writer, tells us in the first chapter, how he has set about to discover the ways of the world. He gave his heart to know wisdom, and to know madness and folly, and he discovered that this was vexation of spirit. Those who give themselves for the things of this world only will find it is vanity. He uses the text as an illustration of life. All the rivers run into the sea, yet the sea is not full. The people who live for this world alone will never

be satisfied. The river of hope will run into the sea of disappointment. The river of youth will run into the sea of old age. The river of time will run into the sea of Eternity. We do not know how long the river of time will flow until it is lost in the sea of Eternity. We do know from the inspired Word that the day will come when the angel will declare time no longer. Rev. 10:6.

Life and immortality are brought to light through the gospel of Christ. We can attain that heavenly paradise through him who said, "I am the way, the truth and the life. The Christ alone makes life really worth while."

The evening subject was: Christianity or Communism. The pastor pointed out how the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch. This was a fulfillment of a prophecy in Isaiah 6:22.

Christianity today is being undermined by communism. For over twenty years communism has been taught. The communists tell us that Christianity and Communism cannot live together. Communists live only for this life. For the Christian there is an eternity.

When a man becomes a Communist he is not master of himself. His party is master. He never doubts the ultimate victory of his party. The Russian communist thinks of his movement as universal.

They teach, there is no God. They are atheists. The communists hope to stamp out all religion and faith in God. No person who believes in Christianity is accepted as membership in the communist party.

The cause for the collapse of the Russian Orthodox church was that they paid more attention to external splendor, pomp and power and lost its soul. The real Christian spirit was lacking. It had not the power to change lives and help troubled souls. The revolutionists said, we do not want anything to do with God, church or religion.

Our business as Christians is not to condemn and rule out the isms but to give forth the gospel truth. The early church thrived on persecution because it was real. Real Christianity cannot be overthrown.

What has taken place in Russia could be taking place in Canada. People are not going to church. In many churches they are trying everything under the sun to keep the church going. If Christ was here he would have some temples to purge and some rebuking to do. Only one thing needed, that is the love and presence of Christ in our hearts. Jesus said: All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. The followers of Christ must come under his power or else nothing can keep us from communism. Back to God. Back to the Bible. A regenerate people is the only way to save the world.

On Sunday evening members of the council, board of education, hydro commission and firemen attended service.

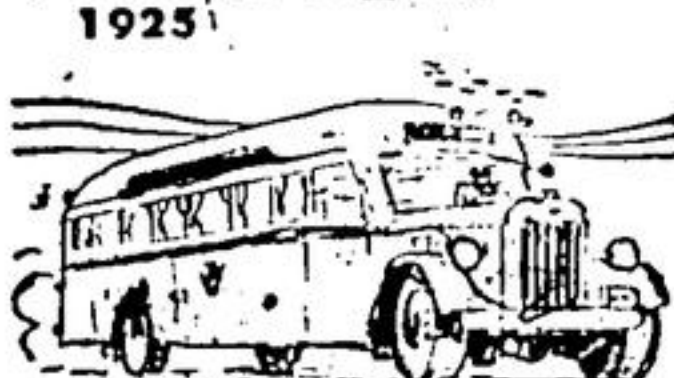
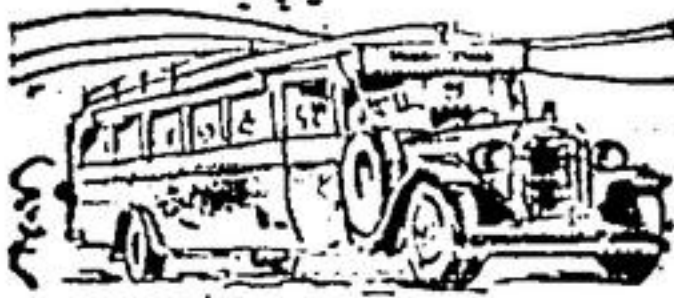

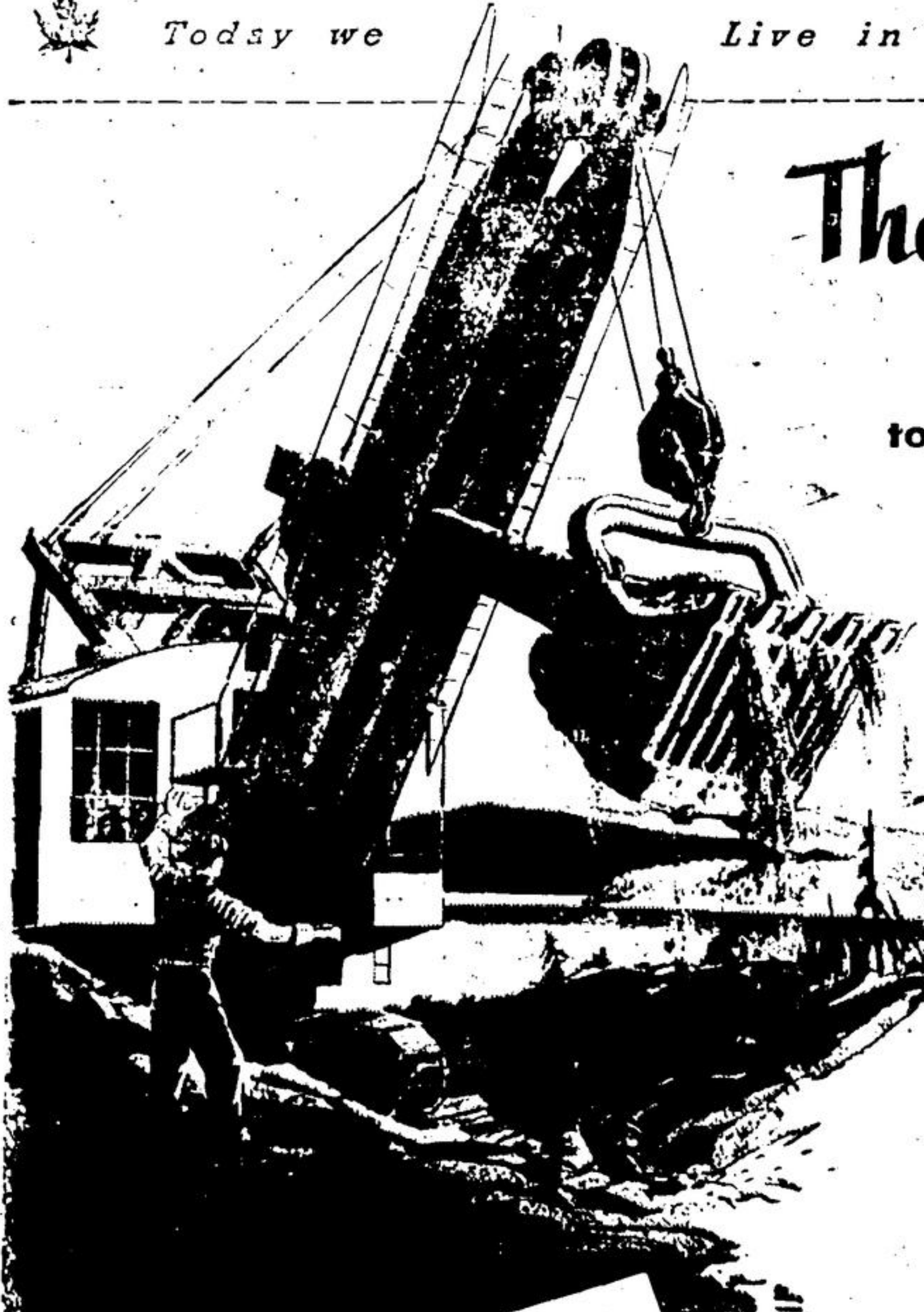
