

Comments on the Lesson

 "With Jesus in the Upper Room"
 Some of us when we think of the Upper Room visualize Da Vinci's great masterpiece of which we have seen reproductions and reprints in our religious periodicals. In this portrayal of the Last Supper we see the Master and his disciples seated around a common table. Such is the setting for this week's lesson. This little band of religious men are breaking bread together and are joining in the spirit of the passover feast. It is on the eve of their Master's betrayal and the indicates that this will be their last meal together. This feast is long to be remembered by the disciples and those who follow, in their faith. For them there is a new significance — the bread and wine become symbols of the broken body and shed blood of their leader and Master, and as often as they eat and drink of these elements they are to remember him. "This is my body, which is broken for you," this do in remembrance of me." — 1 Cor. 11:24.

The Biblical Basis:
 Mark 14:12-25
 This passage reveals Jesus and his disciples preparing for participation in the feast of the passover — a national religious observance commemorating the deliverance of the Children of Israel from Egyptian bondage. It is apparent that secret arrangements have been made for the use of a room and that the disciples are guided to the place by a man carrying a pitcher of water — an unusual thing for that country in that time: the water carrying was a woman's chore. In the evening the disciples gather at the appointed place and the meal and accompanying conversation begin. It is notable that Jesus and his disciples did not break from this ancient tradition. On this partic-

ular occasion, however, the pass-over took on a new significance. From henceforth they would not only remember the Old Covenant of God with his people but His New Covenant with men through Jesus Christ. This was, as it were, the inauguration feast of the Kingdom of Christ.

In this passage, too, we have an indication that Jesus is conscious of Judas' infidelity and of his approaching arrest and death. In these few verses we have the record of a meal which because of its pathos, love, treachery and eternal significance is among the best known events in the history of the world.

The Application:
 Let us derive from this lesson a better understanding of the Lord's Supper. In the lesson we view the original act. In our minds we have knowledge of the sacrament as we observe it. How closely related are the two events? Has the sacrament for us a real spiritual significance or has it become a matter of form — a mere empty ritual? Let us for a few minutes meditate quietly upon the meaning of the sacrament as related to us in our day.

1. We might think of it first of all as a symbolism. The bread and wine being symbolic of the broken body and shed blood of our Lord.
2. We think of it as a memorial — a time of grateful remembrance for the sacrificial act of the Son of God made on our behalf.
3. We think and speak of the act as "communion". Truly it is a real fellowship — fellowship with our fellow worshippers and fellowship with the whole of Christendom in spirit, and above all fellowship with the exalted Christ.
4. Truly it is a sacrament — a time of real spiritual covenant between God and man wherein man accepts God's gift in Jesus Christ and surrenders his life absolutely and unreservedly to this cause.

5. Often the act is spoken of as the "eucharist" — a time of real joyous thanksgiving. Surely as we remember our state of life, and God's love and vicarious act in Jesus Christ, done on our behalf, and as we think of our redeemed condition, we have cause to give thanks.

Now let us examine ourselves in relation to the "Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. When did we last partake? In what frame of mind were we? Does the Lord's Table hold a real significance for us in our daily living? Is it for us "The New Covenant," as it was for the disciples? When last did we covenant with God?
