

STAY-AT-HOME CAMP IN GEORGETOWN THIS SUMMER

Plans for a Stay-At-Home camp this summer in Georgetown were outlined by Don Barrager at the dinner meeting of the Lions Club at the McGibbon House on May 17th. Cooperating in the plan are the Lions Club, Georgetown Recreation Commission and Georgetown Ministerial Association, and the Lions have guaranteed a minimum of \$300 towards the cost of operation. It will be operated in the park and the Old Town Hall the last two weeks in July, with such activities as Bible study, sports, games and handicraft.

Frank Murlin reported that the bandstand in the park had been completed that day and that club

members would hold a "bee" to paint the new structure. It stands on the site of the old judge's stand in front of the grandstand and it is a great improvement at the park. It will be used for the first time on June 10th, when the Girls Pipe Band are staging an entertainment in the park to help finance their trip to the Lions Convention in New York City.

A hockey banquet is planned for May 31st in the Legion Hall when the Lions will again be host to the Intermediate hockey team and the three winning teams in the GRC hockey series. Jack Armstrong is chairman in charge of the evening.

The tug day sponsored in aid of Lions Food for Britain was a success and chairman Fred Schultz reported \$143.52 raised.

Nominations were received for new officers from the nominating committee and additional nominations asked from the floor for the election of officers which takes place at the next meeting.

Alex McLaren reported that the engineer's survey of a proposed swimming pool site in the creek at the John Street bridge showed that it was impossible to obtain sufficient depth of water for a pool and this plan would have to be abandoned. Another handicap to using the river at the present time was the dumping of waste from the papermill into the creek. He suggested that the committee investigate an artificial swimming pool and that a fund be started and donations asked.

Applications for membership from Ernie Crawford, manager of the Roxby Theatre, and Irwin Noble, proprietor of the Georgetown Dairy, were accepted.

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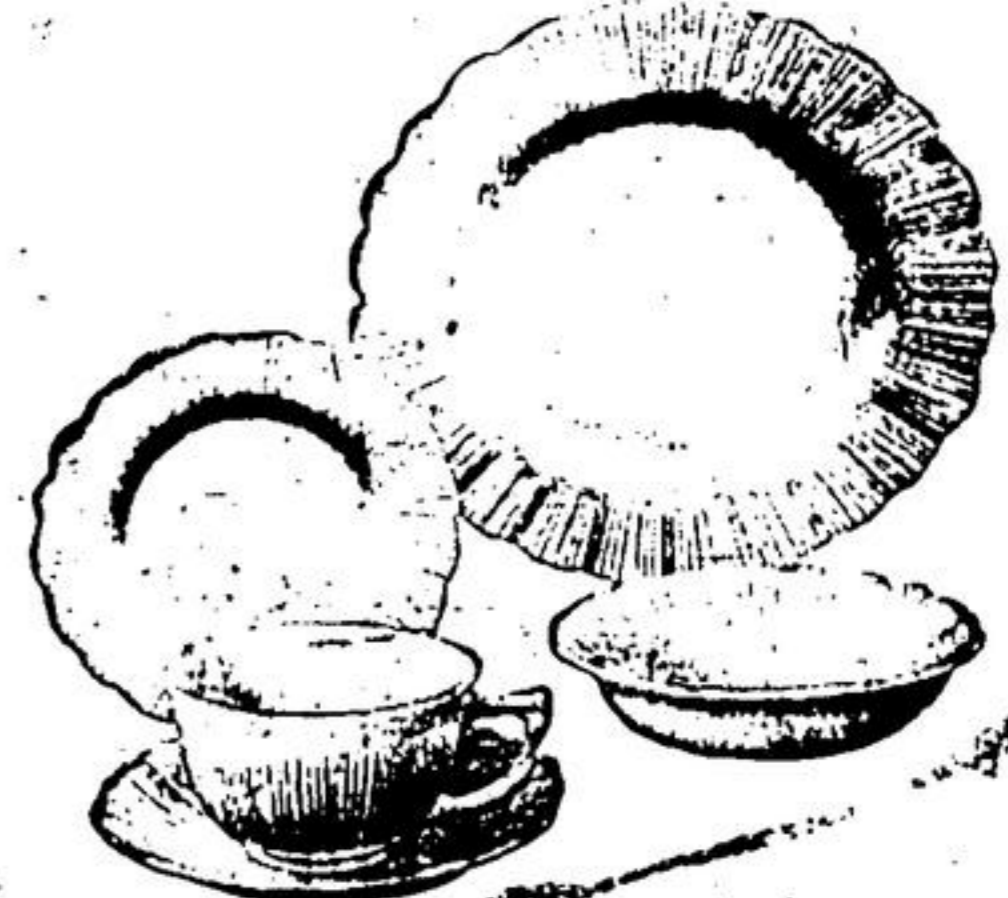
