**Seeking Election As Progressive  
 Conservative M.P. for Halton**

**IS A CANDIDATE WHOSE ROOTS  
 GO FAR BACK INTO THE RICH  
 SOIL OF THIS VENETIAN  
 COUNTY**

That candidate is Miss Sybil Bennett, K.C., whose family has been working a farm in Nelson township for more than 100 years.

Of slightly more than medium height, with a fresh complexion that bespeaks her love for outdoor life, and a mass of light-coloured hair, Miss Bennett is uniquely fitted to represent ably such a county, containing as it does a large rural population on the one hand, and a number of thriving and prosperous communities on the other.

Of particular importance to the farming interests is the fact that she comes from a long line of farmers, that she put herself through University and Osgoode Hall largely by farming, that she still works six acres of fruit and vegetables, and finally, that she spent five years as a solicitor for the Agricultural Board.

With a farm background such as this it is small wonder that Miss Bennett knows the needs and wants of the farmer and is determined, if elected to work with them and for them at Ottawa. "I have always been close to farm life," Miss Bennett says, "and even today when I must make my living in legal work, it is the hours I work on my land that I really enjoy."

"I was called to the bar in 1930 when the depression had just got started and my work on the Agricultural Development Board from then until 1935 not only gave me a deep insight into the problems of the farmers and the heart-breaking times they had to endure, but made me determined that some day I would get into a position where I could do my best to see that never again would they suffer as they did then."

"Too often has agriculture been the step-sister in the Canadian economy—I want to do my part to see that that relationship never returns."

But Miss Bennett's qualifications for the position of Progressive-Conservative member of Parliament for Halton are even broader than so far indicated.

She has made her own way in the legal profession for many years, and this is admirably fitted to represent business as well as agriculture, for her interests have been well divided between town and country. It follows, then that she knows exactly what each group needs for good government.

Widely known as Miss Bennett is, it might be well at this point to trace briefly a little of her background.

Daughter of the late Rev. and Mrs. Clifford Bennett, of Nelson Township, Miss Bennett was born in St. George, Brant county, but her life ever since has been closely allied to that of Halton.

Her father being a minister, much of Miss Bennett's early life was spent in one town or another as he travelled on his circuit.

The late Mr. Bennett preached in Milton from 1906 until 1910, and his daughter spent the first four years of her life there.

"From this bit of information," laughs Miss Bennett, "anyone who cares to can figure out my age pretty closely."

Miss Bennett's public school career started in Warton and ended in Port Colborne, while her high school years began in Port Colborne and came to a close in Chesley. She then went to the University of Toronto, Victoria College, and graduated in 1926. Then came a year of music and then Osgoode Hall, from which she graduated in 1930. She was then called to the bar in November of that year and a high spot of the ceremony was the fact that the late Viscount Ben-

nett, a distant relative, gave her his silk gown. Just 14 years later she was awarded her K.C.

Those years when she was receiving her higher education were not easy ones, Miss Bennett recalls. "Coming as I did from the parsonage," she says, "money was not easily come by, and I had to work my way through. This I did by working an acre of strawberries and by supplying on the organ at the various churches during the summer."

"I finally got through, but my graduation coincided with the depression and things were difficult. I joined the Agricultural Development Board and was a solicitor with the Board until 1936. In those years, naturally my legal work brought me in close touch with agriculture, and I came to know what the farmers were forced to endure. The admiration and respect I gained for them I have never lost."

In 1936, the year her father died, Miss Bennett decided to enter private practice and she fulfilled a promise made to him — to practice in Halton County. Since that time she has been in partnership with LeRoy Dale, K.C., in the town of Georgetown.

But dates and dull statistics do not paint a picture of an individual.

During the past year Miss Bennett has been actively engaged with the Progressive Conservative Party and is perhaps that party's main woman-speaker. Since the war she has travelled extensively throughout Canada on its behalf, finding out what women want from government, and she knows as well as any individual in the country what women want and need politically.

Miss Bennett has also spoken all through the province on behalf of the Women's Institute. Add to this an active interest in the church and one gets the picture of a full and active life.

As for teas and parties, Miss Bennett admits, a trifle sheepishly, that she just hasn't the time. "When my day is done in the office," she says, "I hurry home and busy myself around the house. Like cooking and baking and do my own. In addition, I find that I am happiest when working at my home, either inside the house or on my six acres."

"Home is the fundamental element of our life; it is the basic unit and without a good family life no country can be prosperous or great. I get all my relaxation from my home and not from golf or other sports."

Descending to personalities for a moment, Miss Bennett admits to one failing — hats. "I don't care what clothes I wear for I have little interest in them, but I have one weakness — I like hats, some of them peculiar. I am fond of shopping for my home, too, but much of it is window shopping. I am afraid, prices being what they are."

Miss Bennett is an easy and friendly person to meet and she hopes that win or lose she will meet as many of the voters as possible for she is interested in their problems, whether they be big or small.

"I want to represent Halton as a Progressive Conservative," she says, "and to do that I must represent every individual."
