McNally & Lane Form New Contracting Firm

A new business in Georgetown has resulted from the recent merger of McNally-Wood Products, operated by William McNally, and Lane's Haulage, operated by Bob Lane. The latter has retained certain parts of his business including the garbage contract with the town and his ice delivery business. The new firm operates under the name of McNally & Lane Co., Ltd. and at present has a staff of 24 men on the payroll. They are contractors and dealers in building supplies and have their plant on Elgin Street near the CNR tracks in a building which was built on the foundation of an old building used as the Dominion Seed House in the early days of this company. The plant was built in 1946 by Mr. McNally after fire destroyed his first location on William Street. A sizeable addition has been made since that time and at present work is proceeding on a further addition which will contain offices and a showroom. Joseph Standish is job foreman and Jack Standish shop foreman of the business. Recently William Hamilton, who has been manager of Henry Davis Wood Products on Main Street, joined the firm and will have the position of office manager. Both partners in the firm are self-made Georgetown businessmen who first established their own businesses in a small way. Mr. McNally, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McNally left his employment at the Provincial Paper mill in 1942 and started into business making toys and small articles of furniture. He later branched into contracting and has built many homes in town including several in the Victoria Crescent subdivision, the Trygve Wold and R. H. Jones houses on Maple Ave., Jim Schofield's new home on the highway and his own house on Market St. At present the firm is constructing a new house for James Richardson

District High School Board Asks School at Acton

A delegation from North Halton District High School board will meet in Toronto this Saturday with Department of Education officials. The delegation will ask for the establishment of a central high school adjoining Acton. The committee includes a representative from each of the municipalities in the district, Acton, Milton, Esquesing and Nappan. Decision to make the trip to Toronto was made at a board meeting in Acton on Friday, May 20th. At a previous meeting, the two Acton members had presented a motion calling for the building of a central school at Speyside which was not voted upon. The Acton site was moved at this meeting as an amendment to the original motion and carried. Georgetown will not be represented at this meeting, inasmuch as they are not at present in the District. However, providing County Council passes on their application for entry, which will be presented at the June meeting of county council, Georgetown will become a member in January, 1950, and it is not expected that any definite action can be taken until that time.

Henry McMenemy Dies, Buried in Brampton

A well-known resident of Glen Williams for many years, Henry McMenemy died in Brampton on May 20th at the age of 75. Mr. McMenemy was born in Garafaxa Township, a son of the late James McMenemy and Mary Ann Sloan. His father was a pioneer resident of the township, emigrating from Ireland when a young man. He lived in the Glen for some years and later in Regina, Saskatchewan, where he was employed with the Canadian National Railway. He returned to Glen Williams about fifteen years ago, and had lived for the past few years in Brampton. He was predeceased many years ago by his wife, the former Margaret Burnside. Surviving are two sons, Charles of Hamilton and Harold of Glen Williams, and one grandson. Of the original family of five boys and two girls, two brothers survive, Joseph of Glen Williams and David of Ballinacraigh. A brother, George died at Ballinacraigh last Christmas day. The funeral service was held in Brampton on Saturday, May 21st. His two sons, and a nephew, Jack McMenemy of Georgetown, acted as pallbearers. Interment was made in Brampton Cemetery.

FORMER DISTRICT MAN DIES IN BROOKLYN

James Kenneth Cross, who spent his boyhood in the Georgetown district, died in Brooklyn, New York, of May 11th. He was the eldest son of the late William H. and Isabella Cross, who formerly lived in Stewarttown and his father was at one time bandmaster in Georgetown. He leaves his wife, Sophie, and two sons, William and James of Seneca Falls, in New York. Also surviving are a brother, Dr. Stanley Cross of Westminster Hospital, London, and four sisters, Jessie, Fartin and Agnes of Toronto, and Mrs. Fred Sparks (Hope) of Ottawa.

The funeral service was held in New York, with interment in Inglewood Cemetery, Brooklyn.

Orillia Man Buys Norval Grocery Store

Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Paterson have purchased the grocery store at Norval operated for the past two years by Mr. A. E. Hudson. The building, which also contains living quarters, was constructed a few years ago by Walter Fidler, who operated the business before selling to Mr. Hudson. The new proprietor was born in Peterborough and spent his early life in Otterville. From 1911 to 1927 he was employed with the T. Eaton Company in Toronto as a salesman in boys' furnishings, with leave of absence during the years of the first war when he served with the Canadian army. He later was manager of Canadian Department Stores, operated by Eaton's in Woodstock and Pembroke. For the past eighteen years, he has been a traveller on the road for Dr. Jackson's and Newport Cereal. Mrs. Paterson was born in Montreal and spent many years in Woodstock where her father was a Bank of Montreal manager. Before moving to Norval, they had been living in Orillia.

ANNIVERSARY SERVICES AT UNION CHURCH

The 118th anniversary of the founding of Union Presbyterian Church was celebrated last Sunday when special services were held at the church in the morning and evening. Rev. J. M. Coulter of St. Catharines, a former Brampton minister, preached at both services, and the Lowville Quartette added to the musical part of the services which was in charge of the choir leader, F. L. Thompson. Miss Nora Lyons was organist.

At a special meeting of council last Monday night, the main topic of discussion was water mains, particularly in regard to extensions.

To conform with the Fire Marshal's request that better fire protection be given the upper half of King Street, the 4th Line and Maple Ave., where a 1" water main now exists, it was decided to lay a 6" main from the Smith & Stone Ltd. plant on King Street to the end of the street and along the 8th Line to the intersection of Maple Avenue. A 4" main will be laid from this intersection to the last lot on Maple Ave. Town Foreman Ernie Hyde estimated the cost at \$7,000. This is part of the town water programme under the water works engineers, Dineen, Phillips, and Roberts. It was moved by Councillor McCumber and seconded by Councillor Herbert that the above program be carried out.

A waterworks extension now in progress is the laying of a 4" line along Guelph Street from War-time Housing to a point where a hydrant will give protection to the town limits, and a 2" line from the hydrant to the town limits.

There was considerable discussion about the location of a pump house. The engineer has recommended a property owned by Dr. R. T. Paul and used by him for the growing of gladioli, and council will inspect this site before the next meeting with a view to arranging for a different location for the pump house if at all possible.

Town foreman E. Hyde reported that a water shortage was imminent here, due to the dry weather. Mayor Gibbons asked that a report be ready for the next meeting, on when the installation of domestic water meters would be completed.

The use of the Park was granted to the Young-Conservative Assoc. on June 25th, and to the Lions Club on June 10th.

(McCumber—McNally) A street light will be installed on the new road on Victoria Crescent and also on the public telephone booth on Main Street at Wesleyan.

(McCumber—Herbert) Council decided that a by-law to provide for the election of council by general vote be prepared and submitted to the ratepayers at the election in December, 1949.
