McNally & Lane-Form New Contracting Firm

A new business in Georgetown has resulted from the recent merger of McNally Wood Products, operated by William McNally, and Lane's Haulage, operated by Bob Lane. The latter has retained certain parts of his business including the garbage contract with the town and his ice delivery business.

The new firm operates under the name of McNally & Lane Co., Ltd. and at present has a staff of 24 mon on the payroll. They are contractors and dealers in building supplies and have their plant on Elgin Street near the CNR tracks in a building which was built on the foundation of an old building used as the Dominion Seed House in the early days of this company. The plant was built in 1946 by Mr. Mc-Nally after fire destroyed his first location on William Street. A sizeable addition has been made since that time and at present work is proceeding on a further addition which will contain offices and showroom.
