### Comments on the Lessor.

#### "JESUS SENTENCED TO DEATH"

After his arrest Jesus was tried in a questionable manner by the ecclesiastical authorities and declared worthy of death. The Jewish courts could go no further. It was not within their jurisdiction to execute the death penalty. This came under Roman authority. It was therefore necessary for the priests to bring Jesus before Pilate, the Roman procurator, in order that he might order the condemned man to be put to death. Thus at an early hour, in order that it might not interfere with their Passover religious functions and in order that the friends of Jesus might not cause difficulty, they persuaded Pilate to hold court. Jesus, then, was tried by two courts, the first doing everything possible to seek his death and the second acting rather reluctantly as a "rubber stamp" and "official seal" upon the decision of the first. Throughout it all Jesus exhibited the attitude attributed to him in Peter 2:21-23 "Christ... when he was reviled, reviled not again; when he suffered, he threatened not."

#### The Biblical Basis:

John 10: 1-16

This passage is a description of part of the trial held by Pilate at the request of the Sanhedrin—the Jewish ecclesiastical court. Previous to this he had endeavored to leave the matter entirely in the hands of the Jews but they would not listen since they desired Jesus' death and this could only be achieved by a Roman declaration. Since he found no fault in him Pilate tried a second time to secure freedom for Jesus by placing him alongside Barnabas and giving the people their choice as to which one should be set free as a gesture of mercy at the Passover season. The people under the pleasant direction again thwarted Pilate and Jesus remained the prisoner while Barnabas gained his freedom. Pilate still working to

save Jesus from death but unable in his weakness of character to acquit him outright is here trying to placate the hostility of the priests by having Jesus scourged and humiliated by the Roman soldiers. But the vacillating Roman procurator is confronted by the determined ecclesiastics and they do not give ground. They further their accusations against Jesus to include blasphemy as well as treason and by their attitude so trouble Pilate that he converses privately with Jesus. He seeks to find a way in which he can release Jesus without losing face with the Jews and without losing power as a procurator but he can find no way that will not demand a recognition of purpose which he does not possess. His character is too weak to stand by his own convictions. So Jesus is brought forth and Pilate utters the words which drive the chief priests to fury: "Behold your king." They make their last great declaration "We have no king but Caesar" and Jesus is led away to be crucified—the victim of false accusations, jealous hatred, and unstable character.

#### The Application:

As we read the story of the trial of Jesus in the various gospel records we are conscious of his strength of character which caused him to face every situation regardless of its cunning, treachery and falsified accusations, in a way in which he remained Master. Surely this draws forth our loyalty and a pledge of our consecration.

The lesson this week places alongside the strong and shiftless character of the Christ the wavering personality of the weak and undependable Pilate. Here we see a man who lacked the courage of his convictions. He considered Jesus to be "not guilty" but he feared the cost of such a public decision in defiance of the Jewish Sanhedrin. In other words he wanted to save Jesus, but not at the cost of his own popularity, position and wealth. Can we see something of the Pilate in our attitude to Christian living? Are there times when the Christian thing is the desire of our hearts but we lack the courage to accomplish it because of the

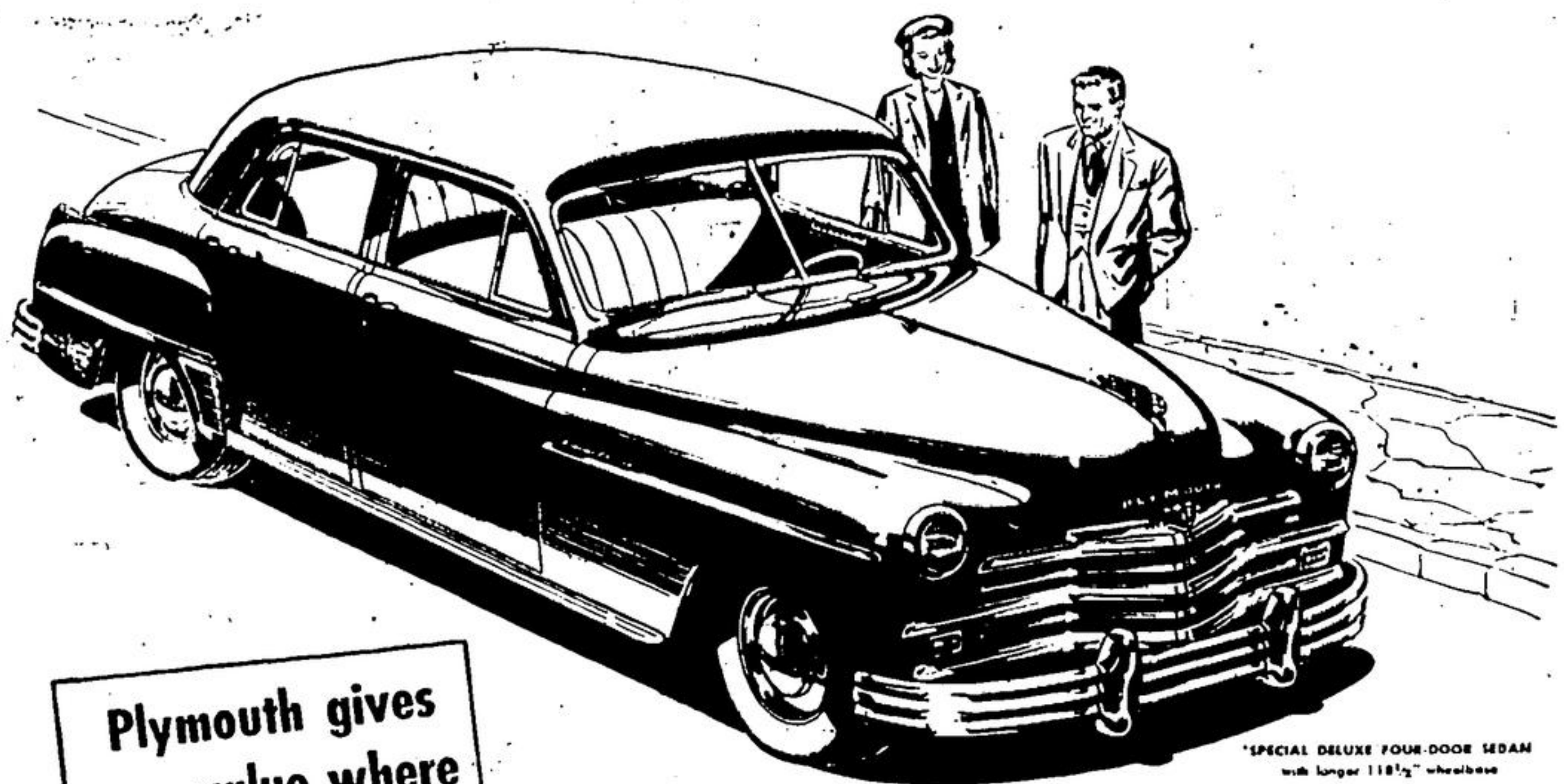

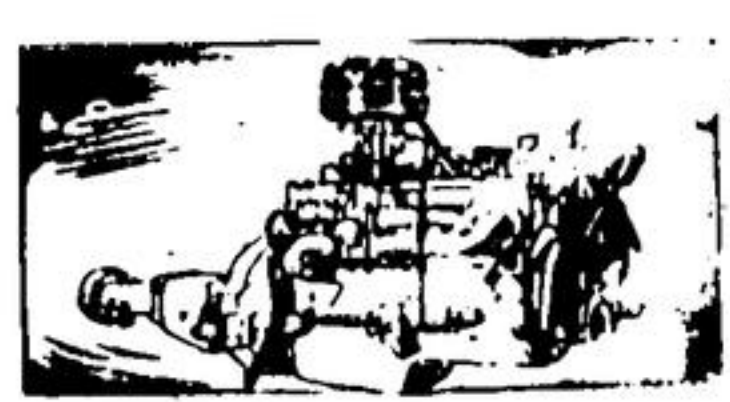
