SLIGO HILL CURVE TO BE STRAIGHTENED

Scene of many fatal accidents in past years, the curving roadway at Sligo Hill on No. 10 Highway, five miles south of Caledon, is to be straightened. The Ontario Government of Highways has awarded a contract to the Dover Construction Company of Brampton and work is expected to start immediately. The job also provides for a 1500-foot diversion for the small branch of the Credit River which flows under the highway at this point, building a new bridge, and decreasing the grade of the hill.

The new road will be almost a mile in length. First stage will be construction of a new bridge 500 feet north of the present bridge. Clearing of the wooded land near the top of the hill, where the newer road will be put, will begin at the same time. Earth and stone removed from the 20 foot cut at the top of the hill will be used to raise the highway level 30 feet at the point where it will cross the old stream.
