To the Electors of Halton: In my letter of last week I-stated that this week I would discuss the question of the possibility of a stalemate with no party having an overall majority: I purposely postponed the discussion of this point knowing that in the meantime we would have the result of the Newfoundland elections as a guide.

On the Saturday preceding these elections Mr. Drew announced at a meeting in British Columbia that his was the only party that could possibly secure an overall majority. Perhaps he intended this statement as a final attraction to the Newfoundland voters just as they were going to vote. Perhaps it was just bad timing on his part.

The Newfoundland vote is now past history. The Liberal party had an overwhelming majority. Five of the Conservative candidates even lost their deposits in two party contests.
