**NEWS AND ITEMS OF INTEREST TO HALTON FARMERS**

**HALTON JUNIORS STAGE ACHIEVEMENT DAY**  
 Championship Trips Awarded to Donna Downs, Geo. C. Wilson, and David Pelletier

One hundred Halton Juniors participated at the annual Achievement Day on Saturday, June 11th. Twenty-five Junior Homemakers, under the leadership of Miss Lucille Barber, County Home Economist, staged their displays and demonstrations at the Milton Town Hall. The projects carried on by the Junior Homemakers during the past year were "The Cereal Shelf", and "Cotton Accessories for the Club Girl's Bedroom." During the afternoon a goodly number of interested spectators followed with keen interest the programme presented by the groups from Ashgrove, Ash, Hornby, and Limehouse.

Miss Donna Downs of the Hornby Club was awarded the Championship award, which is a trip to the 4H Club Congress at Chicago next fall. This award, the funds for which were provided by the Halton Women's Institute, was presented to Miss Downs by Mrs. Chester Service, secretary of the Halton District W.I. The Bank of Toronto Trophy for inter-township competition was won by Nelson Township, represented by the Misses Mildred Reed, Evelyn Pelletier, and Verma Bawden, of the Ash Club. Silver miniatures donated by the Bank of Toronto were presented on behalf of the donors by Mrs. M. J. Brown, vice-president of the Halton District W.I.

A record enrolment of 74 young men judged ten classes of livestock in the morning, on the following farms: Dr. Wm. James (Angus); Johnston Neelands (Holsteins);

Clayton May (Yorkshires); M. C. Bealy (Jerseys); Valley Crest Farm (Clydesdales); and J. H. Willmott (Hampshires). Oral reasons on five of the classes were given by each of the 74 young men in the afternoon, at the Milton High School. The official judges were as follows: A. M. Bari, Associate Director of Extension, Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, Toronto; H. Setchmore, Federal Department of Agriculture, Toronto; J. H. McCulloch, Assistant Agricultural Representative, York County; J. H. Willmott, Milton; and George R. Breckon, of Bromley.

The Championship Trips which this year will likely be through northern Ontario, Ottawa and Eastern Ontario, were awarded to Geo. C. Wilson of Georgetown, and David Pelletier, of Milton. These awards were based on the high aggregate scores of the March and June competitions, and in addition the winners had each coached teams of Juniors. The special section open to previous Trip Winners was won by Ward Brownridge, who incidentally was the high competitor of the day, while the High Novice was Edwin Tyrrell, of Freeman, who was awarded the Canadian National Exhibition Shield. Other awards were as follows:

Bank of Nova Scotia trophy, to the winning Township team, was won by Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb, and Geo. Wilson, of Esquering Township. The Kingway Kiwanis Special to the runner-up for the Championship Trips, was won by Keith Merry, of Hornby; The Palermo Junior Farmers' Trophy, to the coach of the winning team, was won by David Pelletier, the members of his team being Geo. Burkholder, Dave Lillycrop, and Lloyd Vivian; the Norval Juniors' Challenge trophy, for the the Champion Judge of the day, was won by Ward Brownridge of Esquering Township; the Dr. R. K. Anderson trophy to the Junior Farmer Club with the six highest competitors, was won by Norval Club, represented by Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb, Geo. Wilson, Howson Ruddell, John Currie and Floyd Bridgen; the Donald Robertson trophy, for the high score in Horses, by Geo. Pelletier; and the Duncan Campbell trophy, for the high score in Beef Cattle, by Lloyd Vivian; the Mason Knitting Co. Trophy for high score in Sheep, by Don Holmes; the Baronston trophy, for high score in Dairy Cattle, by John Willmott and the Thos. Blakelock Trophy, for high score in Swine, by Mac Sprowl.

The day's programme concluded with the presentation of the awards in the Milton Town Hall, where Miss Ismy Kean, president of the Halton Junior Farmers, acted as the chairman.

**FIELD DAYS ARE POPULAR**

The annual inter-rural public school field day sponsored by the Halton Federation of Agriculture, is scheduled for the Halton Community Park, Lowville, on Friday, June 17th. Thirty-five rural public schools have entered the softball tournament, which will get underway at 10:00 a.m. The programme also includes a softball tournament between Senior teams from each of the four townships, as well as track events for the boys and girls.

Saturday, June 18th, will see another field day at the same centre, when Halton Junior Farmers will compete for the honour of representing the County at the big Western Ontario Junior Farmer Field Day at the Ontario Agricultural College on Friday, June 24th. The program includes a softball tournament which is scheduled to commence at 1:00 p.m., field and track events for both Junior Farmers and Junior Homemakers.

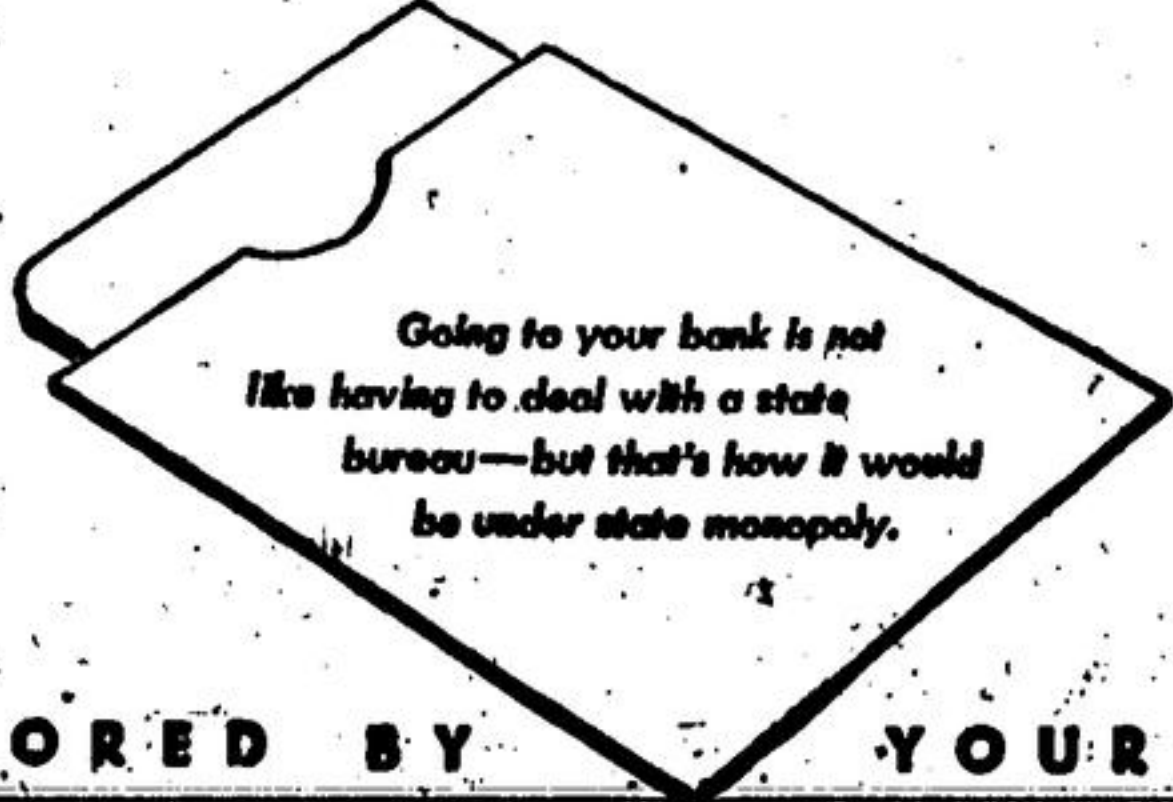
