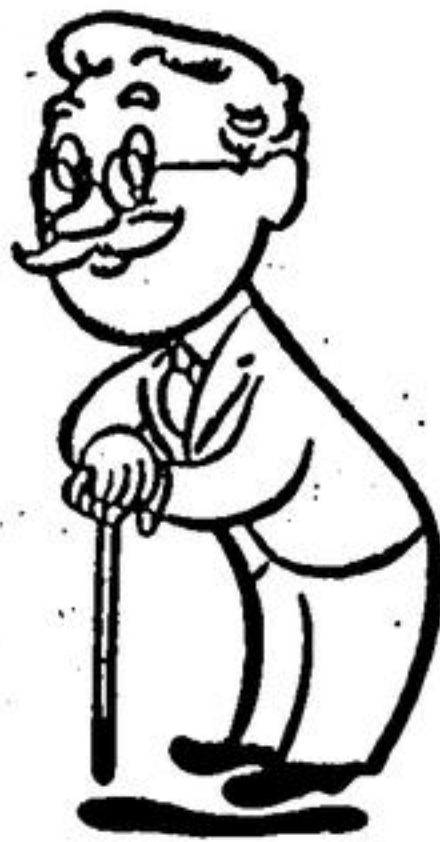

To the Electors of Halton:
As we move into the final days of the election campaign we find that our Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent is continuing to explain to the electors in a courteous manner what his party hopes to accomplish if re-elected.

The most important thing of all is full employment. No nation can be really prosperous without a high volume of production. The wealth of a nation is its total production. The next important factor is a satisfactory market for our production. When our production in Canada is at a high level we have to export about one-third of our total production. We have to exchange our surpluses for the goods of other countries which we require.

The Liberal party has always fostered foreign trade by low tariffs and by reciprocal trade agreements. While it is true that the Conservative party has now recently adopted our trade policy we have not forgotten its stand in the past. The first political campaign in which I took any part was in 1911 and I well remember the slogan of the Conservative party of that day which was "No truck or trade with the Yankees." The Conservative party won that campaign in their opposition to trade reciprocity with the United States. They now see their mistake and in their present platform they advocate reciprocal agreements. Other nations too will not be forgetful of the past attitude of previous Tory Governments and it is for you to decide as to whether the Liberal party or the newly converted Conservative party* will be able to negotiate the best trade agreements for Canada.

With high employment a good domestic market is assured and with the Liberal party in office past performance proves that we can count on the best foreign markets which are available. It is true that the upset condition of the world today has created foreign exchange problems which hamper trade but Canada did not create these problems. On the contrary she has done her full part to help cure them. Some think that our aid to help the recovery of Britain has been too generous. I do not agree with this contention for two reasons. In the first place by helping Britain we are creating markets for our goods and in the second place the sacrifices made by Britain saved the world for democracy.

The third important factor for a prosperous Canada, that is the type of prosperity which Liberalism seeks, is that our prosperity should be shared with reasonable equality by all classes, by labour, by agriculture and by industry. Your Liberal Government has achieved this result. By our policy of taxation we have prevented any mass accumulation of wealth in the hands of a few people. Our taxation policy is very equitable to our Conservative friends. Liberalism stands for the welfare of the masses and is stoutly opposed by the business interests.

With our Liberal Prime Minister carrying on a sane and sound campaign Colonel Drew is getting annoyed. The Newfoundland and the Nova Scotia Provincial elections have gone heavily Liberal. Perhaps this has annoyed him. The recently announced Gallup Poll shows that the Liberals are gaining in strength and this won't improve his manners. He is now making statements of doubtful veracity and statements which if true should have been made by him long ago. His recent Canadian charges are a good example of what I mean. Colonel Drew suppressed this information which he claims he has until it is now too late before the elections to have the facts accurately determined. The Canadian public have Colonel Drew's assertions and Mr. Howe's denials. The matter will have to rest there until the charges can be tried. This transaction occurred over two years ago. If Colonel Drew had any faith in his own charges one would have thought he would have made them months ago. I well remember his indignation at the Gestapo charges of the CCF during an election campaign but the shoe is now on the other foot.
