**to the Electors of Halton:**

My Conservative opponent has finally put in writing what she considers to be the issues of the campaign and her criticism of the Liberal government.

I think I know the electors of my riding well enough to know that you have already answered in your own minds all of her arguments, but as I do not want to be accused of evading them, with apologies to you, I will now deal with them.

First, we are accused of imposing paralyzing taxation, and my opponent has stated that it was foolish for Canada to pay Fifteen Hundred million dollars of the national debt since the end of the war. Our national debt is just like a mortgage on your farm or a mortgage on your home or a debenture charge on your municipality. You pay interest on this debt until you pay the debt. In retiring fifteen hundred million dollars of our national debt while times are buoyant, you have effected an annual saving of forty-five million dollars in interest charges. My opponent says that this is a foolish thing for

Canadians to do. No argument of mine will convince her to the contrary, I leave this without further comment.

Second, my opponent states: "What about foreign trade and the frightening manner in which it has plunged during the last year or two?" I regret to have to say that that statement is simply not correct. Our foreign trade today is at the highest level that it has ever been in our history. It is true, however, that the period ahead will be a difficult one, and that in the future we will have serious trade problems. To me the present attitude of the Conservative party is almost amusing in its sudden regard for foreign trade, because I have not forgotten the fact that in 1911 and again in 1930, the Liberal party lost two general elections when fighting the battle for low tariffs and for expanding our foreign trade. While it is true that the Conservative party has recently adopted the Liberal trade policy of low tariffs and reciprocal trade agreements, I do suggest to you that past performance is a much safer guide for you in reaching a decision than election promises. The present attitude of the Conservative party in criticizing us for pegging the Canadian dollar at par, and their assurance that they will remove this control of the Canadian dollar does show what little value we can place on their promise to you of low tariffs to foster trade. By allowing our Canadian dollar to go to a discount this immediately results in a trade barrier quite as effective as a tariff trade barrier. My opponent states that Canada lost one billion dollars of our reserve of U.S. dollars in the sixteen month period following the pegging of Canada's dollar at par. My opponent, however, neglected to tell you that as a result of our present import restrictions and other remedial measures our present exchange position in regard to U.S. dollars is quite satisfactory. It makes no difference in the end result as to whether this information was deliberately withheld from you

or whether my opponent was unaware of the facts, but I do feel quite strongly that in discussing a point as serious as this one, that the public are entitled to all of the facts, and that half-truths can be very misleading. Our trade position with the United States has usually been heavily adverse, and our trade position with the United Kingdom heavily favourable. Since the United Kingdom is unable to pay to Canada the amount of our favourable balance in U.S. dollars, your government took the position that we should restrict our imports from the U.S. to the types of goods which we really require, and that under present conditions we should not permit our people to use U.S. dollars for luxury goods. This whole foreign exchange problem is a highly technical one, and is one for experts. From recent remarks made by Col. Drew in regard to foreign exchange, I would not put him, in that class. I do suggest to you that in reaching a decision with regard to a problem as complicated as this one that the safest guide is results, and these have been achieved.

Finally, my opponent again comes back to the argument that it is time for a change. Do you want to exchange prosperity and experienced government for promises and inexperience?
