D. W. BAXTER WAS NOTED SPORTSMAN

Following a short illness, a respected resident of town, Dighton Whans Baxter, died in the Private Patients' Pavilion, Toronto General Hospital, on Sunday, June 26th. Mr. Baxter was the son of the late Thomas Baxter and Amanda Knitting and was born at Balsam Lodge, Burlington. He was educated at Upper Canada College and later studied law at Osgoode Hall. After graduation he joined the Hamilton legal firm now known as Lazier and Lazier.

Always a keen sportsman, Mr. Baxter played with Hamilton Tigers in the early days on several championship football teams. He played polo with the Toronto Hunt Club and was a life member of Rosedale Golf Club, Toronto, where he was general manager for twenty-two years.

Harry Holdroyd Once Noted Sportsman

Funeral services were held in St. Alban's Church, Glen Williams last Thursday for Harry Holdroyd who died at his home, 68 Indian Trail, Toronto, on June 28th. Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson conducted the service in the church which Mr. Holdroyd had helped to establish during his residence in the Glen. A native of Yorkshire, England, he was at one time manager of the Sykes and Ainley Knitting Mill (last operated by Glen Textiles Ltd.) in the Glen and during the first war moved to Toronto where he established his own textile business which now operates as H. Holdroyd & Son. He was the oldest living Past Master of Credit Lodge, AF & AM, holding that office in 1898.

Surviving are his wife, formerly Eva Williams, who is a sister of the late Mrs. W. H. Willson of Georgetown, three daughters, Mrs. J. C. Copp (Norma), Mrs. P. G. Blake (Georgette) and Mrs. S. W. Mason (Edith) and one son V. C. Holdroyd, all of Toronto. Interment was made in Glen Williams Cemetery.
