# Speyside "Out" as Central School Location

No Decision on Site Until Georgetown Joins District, Says Department - Esquesing Share Too High: Reeve

sanction no decision on the location of a central high school for North Halton until after Georgetown has officially joined the district in January. This information was conveyed to a meeting of council and school represeentatives of the five municipalities involved in the district by G. L. Duffin, executive assstant of the Department, at a meeting in Esquesing Community Hall last Thursday. The meeting had been called, at the suggestion of the Department, by the present Halton High School Board. Duffin said that the Department favoured locating a central school in or adjacent to the largest centre of population in an area, although if there was a substantial majority on the board favouring another location, the department should be

The Department of Education will

willing to approve it. Arthur Beaumont of Glen Williams, who is chairman of the North Halton High School District board opened the meeting and asked for the election of a chairman for the meeting, Dr. Carl Martin of Milton, former board chairman, being chosen to preside. Dr. Martin said that he knew all those present were as anxious as he was to see the matter of high school education settled to the satisfaction of the department, the ratepayers and keeping in mind at the same time the provision of the best education possible for North Halton children. Two main points, he thought, could be settled at the meeting, first of all clearing up a misconception that the department could not O.K. any location except Speyside for school site because of the vote at a similar meeting four years ago in Milton, and secondly deciding whether this would be a single or mul-

tiple school area. He first called on Mr. Duffin to explain the aepartment's attitude. Mr. Duffin said that the location of a school is a matter to be decided by the area board, which then goes to the municipal councils concerned to ask for a debenture issue If council will not pass the debenture issue it must go to a vote of all ratepayers qualified to vote on money matters in the district. This district had been established with The idea of one central school, and while Speyside was on file as a location, the district board was the body to pick a site. The department tral school can offer the best education, but realizes that local pride might veto this and it is not always possible to have this ideal. The department believes a school is better located in a town for several reaosnss, the main ones being that transportation costs are cut down and that teachers are inclined to stay longer if they do not have to travel to work. A district board must decide what is jointly the best economy and the best education.

# Health Unit Advises Safeguards Against Polio

(Halton Realth Unit Press release)

As happens each summer, the spectre of poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) is again with us. Each year, mothers face with fear the prospect that this disease may appear in the community. No one can blame the mothers for having this fear: the crippling results of the disease may be seen in most dis-

Thus far, there have not been any cases in this county and only one in surrounding counties. This one case occurred last week in Brampton. It illustrates that no family is completely safe since the case was the 6 year old daughter of the County Health Officer in Peel County.

There are many things that are cause and spread of this disease but for avoiding the disease are well

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the United States has recently issued the fol-The lowing: "Message to Parents" In case the disease becomes epidemic in an area:

"Avoid crowds and new contacts in trains, buses, or boats, if possible; avoid crowded places where you may be close to another's breath or

Avoid over-fatigue: too active play, late hours, worry, irregular living schedules may invite a more serious form of the disease.

Avoid swimming in water which has not been declared safe by your realth department.
