Changed the rate of pay of town employees to 88c an hour with no evertime pay except for Sundays when time and a half will be paid. Alf Collins will be paid an extra \$50 a year for serving as weed inspector.

(Moved by Armstrong and Dav-

Mayor Gibbons introduced the subject, saying that there were difficulties in the previous wage rate which was 85c an hour plus time and a half for all overtime. Often the men had to work overtime drawing gravel, etc., and it was felt that the extra pay was too high for this work. The men had agreed to the new basis and he believed it was a fairer system.
