## New County Home? Decision Tonight

One of the most important problems ever facing county council will be decided tonight at a special meeting in Milton, when the question of whether to continue to maintain a joint home for the Aged with Peel County or break away and establish a separate home in Halton will come up for final discussion. The question was thoroughly explained at last week's county council meeting by Reeve Jack Armstrong of Georgetown, head of a special committee dealing with the problem, but several council members thought it should be referred to individual municipal councils before a final decision was made.

At Monday's town council meeting, Reeve Armstrong explained the proposal for a separate Halton home, which he is in favour of. The present Peel-Halton home, he said, was first established by Peel County in 1901. It is located in a former farm house on No. 7 highway on the western outskirts of Brampton. In 1909, Halton entered into an agreement to use the home on a joint basis and paid \$9,000 to Peel as Halton's share of the \$18,000 assessed value. Since then several improvements have been made to the building, and some time ago the board which administers the home decided on a \$100,000 expenditure for an addition. The Department of Welfare turned down the plan submitted and pointed out that the government now specifies that patients be segregated into three classes, ambulatory, senile and bed patients. New plans were drawn up and the expenditure is now estimated at \$168,000. Of this, \$30,000 is for a new boiler house, \$130,000 for an addition and the balance for renovating and architect's fees. Reeve Armstrong pointed out that a further expenditure of up to \$25,000 will have to be made at a later date in order to hook up to the Brampton sewerage system. A disadvantage of spending so much money on the present building is that it would still not accommodate

many more residents than at present and if accommodation was to be provided for another thirty, the cost would jump by \$85,000.

A new building in Halton would cost around \$500,000. The government pays 50 per cent of this and Halton's equity on the present building should amount to about \$50,000. Reeve Armstrong estimates that it would cost Halton about \$125,000 more to proceed with a separate building, taking all these factors into consideration.

The cost of a debenture issue spread over 20 years would be \$14,000 for Halton. Each municipality pays on an equalized assessment basis and Georgetown's estimated yearly cost would be \$700.

Deputy Reeve Jim Goodlet expressed himself at the meeting as wholly in favour of the new plan. Mayor Gibbons did not commit himself except to say that he could see difficulties sooner or later if control of a building was shared by two county councils. He said that it was refreshing to have a county matter referred to local councils and that it was unique in his experience, as normally county council did not confide in the smaller councils. Personally, he said, he was content to let the matter rest with Georgetown's two representatives who had the confidence of the council and the townspeople to make a wise decision.
