Painting Being Done At Two Local Schools

The summer holidays have provided an opportunity for painting and decorating at both the public and high schools and this work is now in progress. At the Public School, Jim Kennedy has contracted for the job of painting three rooms. The Kindergarten-Primary classroom is being done in two shades of blue and the entrance class will have rose woodwork and pastel green walls. Miss Wilma Stulz's classroom is being painted in two shades of yellow. This will almost complete the painting of all the school interior which was begun three years ago by the school board. Each classroom combination which is in line with the current trend in school decorating. The work of converting the former assembly room into a classroom is also in progress. Waite Home Given to Brampton Hospital

Rowanwood, painted home of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. C. Waite, Main Street South, Brampton, has been offered to Peel Memorial Hospital as a gift. The announcement was made last week by J. A. Carroll, chairman of the hospital board of governors.

One of Brampton's loveliest homes, it contains seventeen rooms, has a large swimming pool and beautiful rock and flower gardens cover the four-acre property. It is valued at \$100,000.

In making the gift, Mr. Waite informed the board they could use the property either as a nurse's residence or sell it and use the proceeds for other hospital purposes.

Active in hospital affairs for twenty years, both Mr. and Mrs. Waite have held various positions

on the board of governors. President of the board in 1946, Mr. Waite is chairman of the building committee which at the present time is endeavouring to enlarge the 38-bed hospital. A new 28-bed addition costing \$250,000 is now under construction. Mrs. Waite has been vice president of the Women's Hospital Aids Association for ten years, a member of the Peel Memorial Board for 13 years and vice president for the past five years.

Mr. Waite is president of the Mining Corporation of Canada and is one of Brampton's most public-spirited citizens. He was a generous donor to the War Memorial Arena and has always been active in Red Cross and Community Chest
